Chapter 127—Greek Women and Their Hair.

Greek women seem never to have bobbed their hair—at least if we may judge by statues. I am showing you some heads which belonged to statues made in Athens. One thing you will notice is that the eyes are blank. That is because the sculptor failed to make the eyes definite. In spite of this, I think you will feel those heads have a noble appearance. Do you like the head-dresses pictured? Most of them seem good-looking to me; but one woman has rather foolish-looking ringlets. Greek women had still other fashions in head-dress. Often they draped the hair in such a way that the ears could be plainly seen. Veils were commonly worn when women ventured outside their homes. Hats were seldom used, except for long journeys.

Women in Athens had quite a great deal to do inside their homes. There was spinning and weaving. (Of course there weren't any clothing "mills" in those days; cloth had to be made in the different houses.) That sort of work was likely to be tiresome. If the woman was rich, she put her slaves to doing it, while she embroidered or did some other light and enjoyable work. The women were allowed to watch certain kinds of plays, and on holidays they might match in parades. Those were the chief times at which they were able to get outdoors. Since they were kept so much inside the home, it is no wonder that few Greek women ever proved themselves great.
