Should Be Good Patronage.
The Board of Trade should seek to have the sleeper kept on the C. N. R. for the benefit of Kingstonians travelling between Kingston and Toronto and from Toronto to Kingston. A sleeper has been run every night each way for the past two months, and has been liberally patronized but chiefly by excursionists who wanted to go down to Montreal from here by boat. But if Kingstonians knew they could board a sleeper at 9 o'clock every night, either in Toronto or Kingston, there should be good patronage.

A Canadian Opinion.
The London Daily Mail of 18th August has this letter from a former Kingston resident: To the Editor of the Daily Mail. Sir,—As a Canadian visiting London, I have followed with admiration your great fight for honour and justice.

Canada, with a population of some eight millions—but few more people than your Greater London—at the very first call of the mother-country in danger enlisted 595,441 men, 90 per cent. of whom volunteered. She sent overseas 418,052 men, and suffered 220,182 casualties. In addition, she burdened herself with a debt it will take many generations of her small population to pay.

The dominions regard London as the heart of the empire. If your government would bequeath it, as such, to the coming ages, and strengthen the bonds of Empire, they cannot further that cause by deserting our allies and taking to their arms the ruthless authors of all our common sufferings, even while we are still erecting monuments to our glorious dead.
