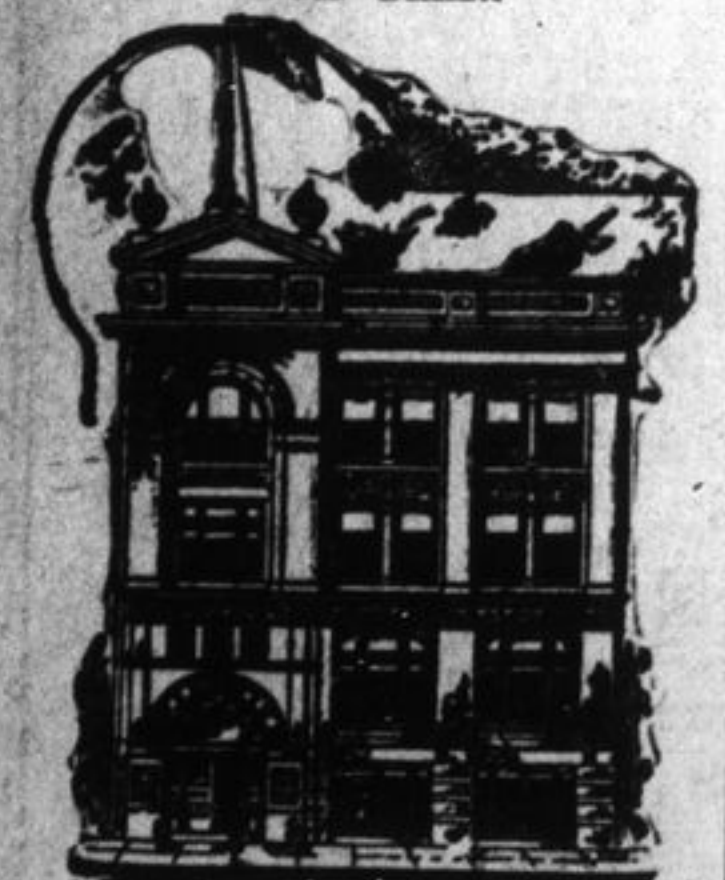


THE BRITISH WHIG 90TH YEAR.

Quoting again from his article: "The bits of clay of two and a half millenniums ago have demonstrated that Josephus 'had the dope.'"

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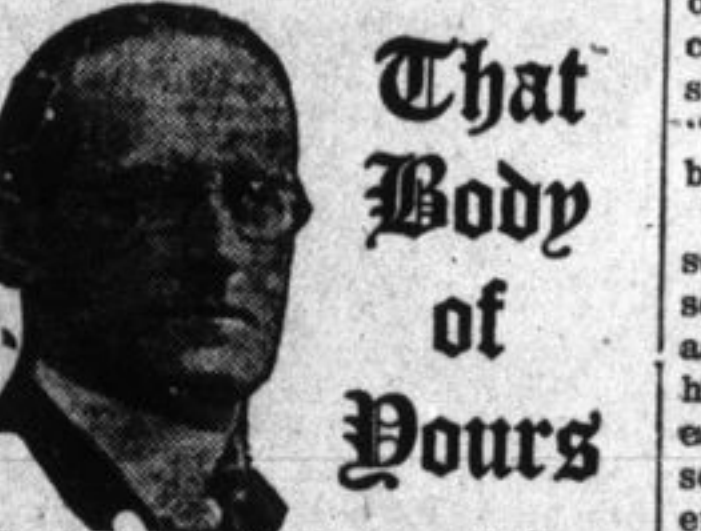
