More Encouraging Outlook. London, Sept. 6. A more encouraging outlook on the situation in Japan was received today at the foreign office from the British consul at Kobe.

The consul's message said that two persons, who had walked from Tokio to Yokohama, confirmed the reports of the enormous destruction in the latter city, but their account of the situation in regard to foreigners in Tokio was encouraging.

British eye witnesses state that damage to the central and official business districts in Tokio is not so great as was at first believed, and it now seems possible that the British embassy building and the consulates in the capital city may have been spared.

A despatch received here from British naval officer in Yokohama states that all foreign residents in Tokio escaped, but that seventy were killed in Yokohama.
