MARTIAL LAW IS ENFORCED

Casualties Exaggerated.

Shanghai, Sept. 7.—All today's reports from Japan indicate that the first estimates of the loss of life and damage from the earthquake, tidal waves and fire were much exaggerated. A message received here estimates the casualties in Yokohama at fifty thousand and that thirty thousand had been counted west of Tokio.

British vice-consul Haigh at Yokohama was killed in the earthquake. The wife of Surgeon Commander William Hingston, who was in charge of the Yokohama naval hospital, also was killed. The remainder of his staff and their families escaped. The Swiss minister and personnel of the legation are safe. German consul General Herr Thiel and his family, German Ambassador Solf and family, together with the family of the Belgian ambassador and the French ambassador, Paul Claudel and his wife, are reported to have escaped.

Thirty-Day Moratorium.

Osaka, Sept. 7.—The Japanese government has proclaimed a thirty-day moratorium for payments falling due from September first to thirtieth. It is applicable only in the zone of the disaster.

Persons profiteering in necessities are liable to imprisonment for three years or a fine of three thousand yen, while any one found guilty of spreading rumors with the object of encouraging rioting, damaging property or disturbing peace may be imprisoned for ten years or fined three thousand yen.

Freedom for Felons.

Osaka, Sept. 7.—All money in the Bank of Japan vaults was saved from destruction in the fire which followed the earthquake and tidal wave. A recapitulation of the earthquake and fire area to-day showed Yokohama as its centre, extending north and south about 100 miles, 140 east and west, including 33 counties, five large cities, inhabited by 7,000,000 people.

The fire at Yokohama brought freedom to felons confined in prison there, as they were released when it became apparent the prison was in the path of the flames. Additional divisions of troops have been ordered from Osaka to Tokio, equipped with provisions and machine guns.
