A BOMB WAS HURLED AT A TORONTO HOUSE

Gabrielle Cecil Had Been Threatened For Not Sending Money to Gang.

Toronto, Sept. 8. — A bomb, filled with some high explosives, was hurled against the front of Gabrielle Cecil's home at 37 Henderson avenue at two o'clock this morning, blowing in the front bedroom window. In which the four little Cecil children were sleeping. The children were nearly hurled out of bed by the force of the explosion and were terror stricken. They were sleeping in the front bedroom downstairs. The bomb was placed beneath the north-east corner window. Across the hall in the west front bedroom slept Mr. and Mrs. Cecil and their sixteen-months old child. In another room were Emanuel Nardelli and Joe Beccalx.

The explosion shook the neighborhood for a distance of several blocks, waking householders, who rushed out in the streets.

Queenie Cecil told reporters her father had received two letters since May last, demanding a thousand dollars because the writers of the letters stated their gang was in jail, and if the thousand was not forthcoming, they would do him damage.

AN EXCITING INCIDENT.

In The Harbor When Sailing Yacht Got Into Trouble.

An exciting incident occurred in the harbor near the Wolfe Island ferry wharf about 4 o'clock on Friday afternoon when a sailing vessel got into trouble off-shore owing to the heavy seas. The occupants of the small vessel, which was about twenty-five feet in length, included two men and a woman, the latter being greatly frightened. The small craft was badly disabled.

After hearing the cries for help, Capt. Sudds of the schooner Granger, and two members of his crew, Joseph O'Neill and James Purcell, attempted to rescue the party, but their motorboat became unmanageable and the rescuers were blown north of the causeway. The unfortunate members of the sailing craft crew were finally landed safely on shore through the efforts of Capt. Mitchell of the schooner Burt Barnes.

The disabled yacht is now moored below the causeway and it is expected that she will have to undergo repairs before she will be seaworthy again.
