

FIVE PRISONERS ESCAPE FROM THE PENITENTIARY

Set Fire to Stables, Used Smoke As Screen And Scaled the Wall With Rope Ladder.

Stole An Automobile On King Street And Fled Out Division Street—The Car Found Abandoned Four Miles North-East of Kingston.

Search Organized. An organized search, under charge of Warden Ponsford, was started immediately upon the alarm being sounded at the big prison.

Get Away In Auto. Mr. Thomson picked up a large stone and forbade the men taking the auto, but after being held off for a minute, the convicts jumped into the automobile and travelled at a high rate of speed.

Warden Ponsford, when seen by a representative of the Whig, shortly after the escape, stated that until such time as all the prisoners were placed in their cells he would be unable to tell the names of the missing men.

Fire Brigade Called. Although nothing definite may be learned until an inquiry is held on the affair, it is understood that the escape was a well-planned ruse, and that the fire in the stables was started by one of the conspirators as a screen to their escape.

Those who Escaped. The names of the escaped prisoners are Bryans, Brown, Slade, Simpson and McMullen.

Struck Guard with Pitchfork. One of the guards who happened to be near the convicts when they first escaped attempted to stop them, and he was struck with a pitchfork.

One Convict Wounded. It is thought that one of the convicts was wounded during his escape. When a representative of the Whig visited Arthur Kemp's farm, it was found that the automobile in which the men made their escape had been struck by some bullets which were fired by guards of the penitentiary.
