Island City Squad Trims Trent Valley Winners 12 to 8.

The Tweed baseball team, winners of the Trent Valley League and semifinal winners over Trenton, winners of the Northumberland Baseball League, were defeated 12 to 8 by Brockville there Saturday in the first of home and home games for the Ontario Baseball association intermediate championship.
