

The great charm of "Yes, we have no bananas today" is that is doesn't mean anything.

The song itself has coherence, so that when you get the entire setting the effect is altogether lost, and "Yes we have no bananas" sinks to the level of the Carolina Mammy group and the whole range of Homesick Blues. But it is the slogan rather than the song that has caught the fancy of America. Fifty per cont. of the people who have heard it think it is an advertising motto or the formula of a secret benefit society, and the majority of the remaining fifty per cent. could no more repeat the rest of the words than they could repeat the Canadian national anthem. It is the slogan that has sold the million odd copies, and from the point of view of delirious inanity the slogan is worthy of Lewis Carroll or Edward Lear.


