JEFFERSON SHORE HAVEN FOR LAKE LIQUOR RUNNER

Fast Craft Speed From Canada and Discharge Cargoes into Automobiles.

Watertown, N.Y., Sept. 21.—The latest last week near Charlotte of a motor boat laden with liquor revealed that the craft a few days before had put into Sacket Harbor to escape a storm and has turned attention of federal prohibition agents to the Jefferson county shore as offering a possible haven for bootleg craft. Liquor is being landed along the eastern coast of the lake, it has been determined.

Some months ago a caravan of automobiles, heavily loaded, was captured near Fox Creek, town of Lyme. A large yacht, which had turned most of its cargo over to the short party, was lying off the docks when the federal agents appeared. The boat gained open water of the lake. This is the only capture involving lake transportation that has been recorded in this county.

Two years ago federal agents became convinced liquor was being landed on the Ellsberg beaches. Officers were observed along the sand dunes of this desolate coast and officers were detailed to watch.

Landing Places Known. Either the bootleggers became aware of the trap being laid for them, or successfully eluded enforcement men.

Scores of boxes labeled as containing whiskey, scattered along Jefferson county shore line from Tibbett's point to Mexico bay have given rise to the theory that small boats were plying an illicit trade. It has become known that recently officials have procured information which is believed to have identified the landing places and signal system utilized in this traffic.

Landing often in the open lake shore, although usually taking advantage of some dock remotely located, the power boats deliver cargoes to waiting confederates. Fast, high powered automobiles are now in readiness, either at the scene of landing or not far distant, and the cargo is loaded immediately and whisked off down state or to some selected depot.

Signal With Lights. The boats avoid harbors and bays, and for this reason calm nights are chosen for landings. With engine exhaust muffled and lights extinguished, the fast crafts speed over the lake, their crews scanning the shore for the signal dashes that will indicate their port and tell them that the coast is clear.

An automobile, parked facing the lake, serves as a beacon. At a distance its two lights blend into one, and may be seen over the water for several miles. It is said a telegraphic signal system has been perfected, and the beams of the twin lamp flash dots and dashes over the lake. There is no mistaking the lights and their signals. On the liquor boat the pilot puts his prow landward and silently the craft slips into its haven, deposits its cargo and glides away.

Niagara Falls, Sept. 21.—In a contest between a horse and a motor car late Wednesday night the horse came off the best. Charles Cummings and George Stewart were motoring along Lundy's Lane, where the horse, which had broken loose from a field, was hit. The car was stalled, and the horse, in its excitement, kicked the radiator and the front of the engine to pieces, smashed the lamps, went to the side and kicked the mudguard into scrap iron, and then dashed off to the back.
