BELGIUM'S DEFICIT AIDS SETTLEMENT

S. A. Bleakney, Trade Commissioner, is in Canada on a Holiday.

S. A. Bleakney, Canadian Trade Commissioner to Belgium, landed at Quebec on Friday on the Minnedosa and proceeded to Ottawa. He is a son-in-law of Inspector J. Russell Stuart, Alice street. They will arrive here on Oct. 1st. After being four years in Belgium Mr. Bleakney said that he was returning to Canada on a short holiday, and to acquaint Canadians of the Canadian manufactured products needed in Belgium.

He said that Belgium imported from Canada in 1922 to the extent of \$12,000,000, and would, in his opinion, no doubt do the same this year. Speaking of trade conditions, Mr. Bleakney declared that business was good and that there was no unemployment. The rate of exchange was a great detriment to trade in Belgium, that country having to pay at dollar rate for all goods imported and to carry on at home with deflated rates of exchange. Besides the national budget last year, Belgium had a deficit of two billion francs which he regarded as the reason for the strong wish for reparation settlement. In the meantime it must be understood that, while Belgium had a military agreement with France, she also had one with England, and was at the present balanced between the two.

HELP FOR JAPAN

A series of some 1,300 earthquake shocks occurred in Japan on September 1st and the following days. After the earthquakes came terrible fires, destroying thousands of the light Japanese houses which (because earthquakes are so frequent) are built mainly of wood and paper. Tokyo alone is said to have lost over 200,000 houses.

MUST BE U. S. CITIZEN.

Before a Doctor Can Practise in New York State. The authorities at Queen's Medical College have been notified that in future all doctors who wish to practise in the United States must be American citizens. This new rule will mean that any Queen's medical students who have figured upon crossing the border and starting practice after their graduation from the local university will have to change their plans. Before a person can become a citizen of United States he must be a resident for five years.

For years Queen's doctors have been going to the United States to try their state board, and take up practice.

It is understood that the new law has been made by the state legislature to keep out European doctors who have been coming over in large numbers to New York state.
