The application made on July 10th

Queen's Library.
The building of the new library at
Queen's is being expedited as fast as
possible. The roof steel will be laid
the early part of next week and the
beautiful arched windows, the first
of their kind, will also be erected.
These windows will require about
one hundred and thirty stones apiece
to hold them in position.

A School Magazine.
The first school magazine out this
fall is The Torch, from Napawee Col-
legiate Institute. Principal Morden
has given full outlines of the courses
of study, and has printed the time
tables of the various forms. A bio-
graphical sketch of W. J. Taylor,
Woodstock, an old Napawee C. I. boy,
and a clever Journalist now, is given.

"Kiddies" at the Fair.
The Weather Man was not at all
favorable for the school children's
day at the fair. The rain on Thurs-
day gave the youngsters a setback,
but on Saturday they came back
strong with a very large attendance
at the big show. The youngsters
gathered up all the souvenirs they
could get their hands on and appear-
ed to take great delight in it.

To Vote on the Matter.
The Gananogue council will sub-
mit the question of daylight saving

to the electors at the coming multi-
ciple elections. It is said much of
the opposition has changed its atti-
tude. Daylight saving would begin
in May.

Contributed \$500.
The G.W.V.A., of Carleton Place,
to show its appreciation of the as-
sistance rendered by the town some
years ago, and to assist in the work
of the memorial park committee in
erecting a suitable memorial to those
who sacrificed their lives in the
Great War, granted the sum of \$500
to the work of that body.

big show, but came in two and three
days and had a great time. The fact
that they had the use of an automo-
bile made it possible for them to
make these trips.

Asking for Assistance.
There has been no Methodist cir-
cumlocution on the Vennachar circuit
since the fire twenty-one years ago.
Rev. P. A. Scott and Albert Lock-
wood reported that they had building
material and a fine lot purchased,
and are prepared to erect at once.
The Napawee district recommend-
ed that the general board of missions
make a grant of \$500 to assist in the
project.

Teachers Engaged.
Miss Ash has been secured to fill
the position of commercial special-

ist in Perth Collegiate Institute vac-
ated by the resignation of Miss
Dickson until the first of January at
the rate of \$2,100 per annum. Miss
Banks will fill the position from New
Years to the summer holidays at the
rate of \$2,200 per year with the un-
derstanding that she proceed next
summer holiday's to secure full speci-
alist standing.
