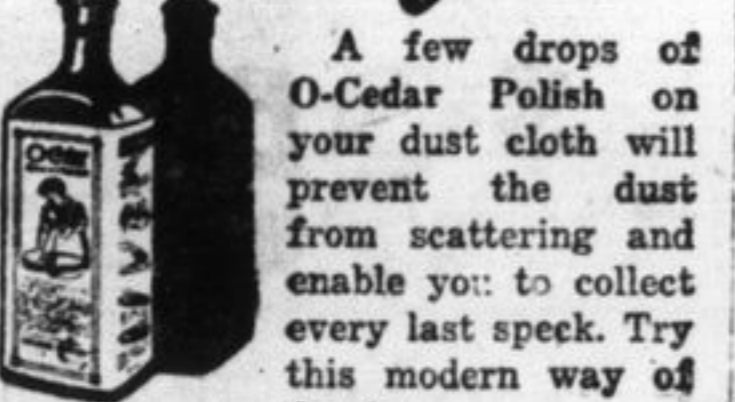

Mr. Brace will assume his new duties on Oct. 1st. He is a son of the late Dr. William Brace, and was born in Brockville.

To Place Immigrants.
The local employment bureau has been asked to report on the possibility of placing harvesters from the Old Country on farms for the winter, and farmers desiring help are being asked to file their applications immediately in order that an approximate estimate may be made of the local needs, for the information of the immigration authorities who are endeavoring to place 12,000 British immigrants who come to Canada during the harvest rush and who are likely to return home unless they can be placed for the winter.

Another Term at Queen's.
Queen's University next year will provide a third term so that public, separate and high school teachers may take honor degrees such as M.A. or specialist degree to qualify them for higher position. Dr. MacClement announced to a large number of teachers and civil servants at Ottawa. The term will extend from the first week in June to the third week in August and two such terms will be equivalent to a full intra-mural term. Queen's is the first university in Canada to establish this third term.

"It is learned on good authority that the convicts got clear of the district east of Toronto, where they were last seen, and came directly to Toronto, probably within four days after their escape by means of a stolen automobile. Friends and confederates are believed to have harbored and given them money and clothing and arms.
Police officials are baffled to know how they managed to get away from the country around Kingston without leaving some trace, and it leads to the belief that some of their friends went to some point outside of Kingston Mills and gave them clothing and assistance down there.
