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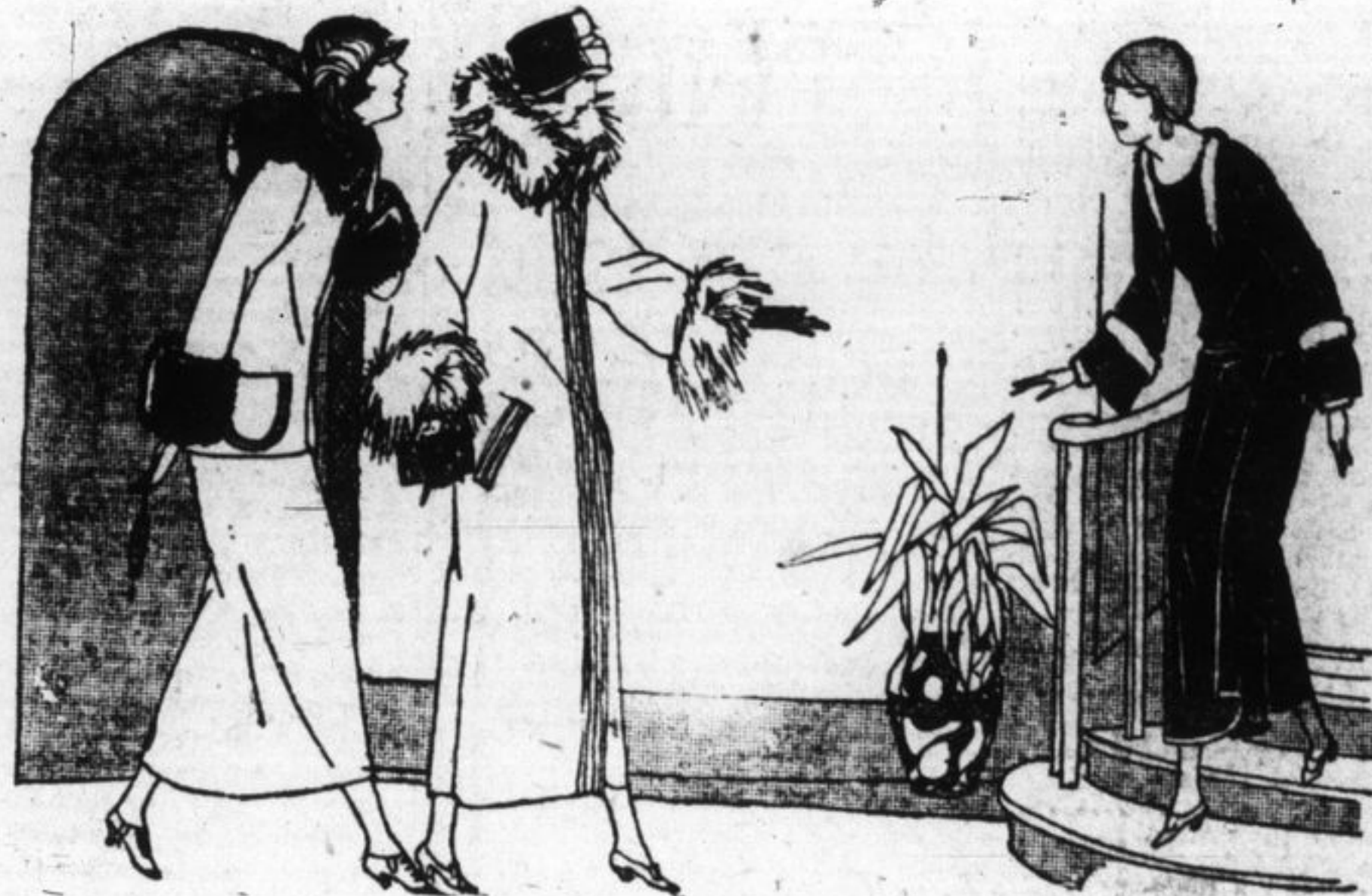
## CHILD'S STORY OF THE HUMAN RACE

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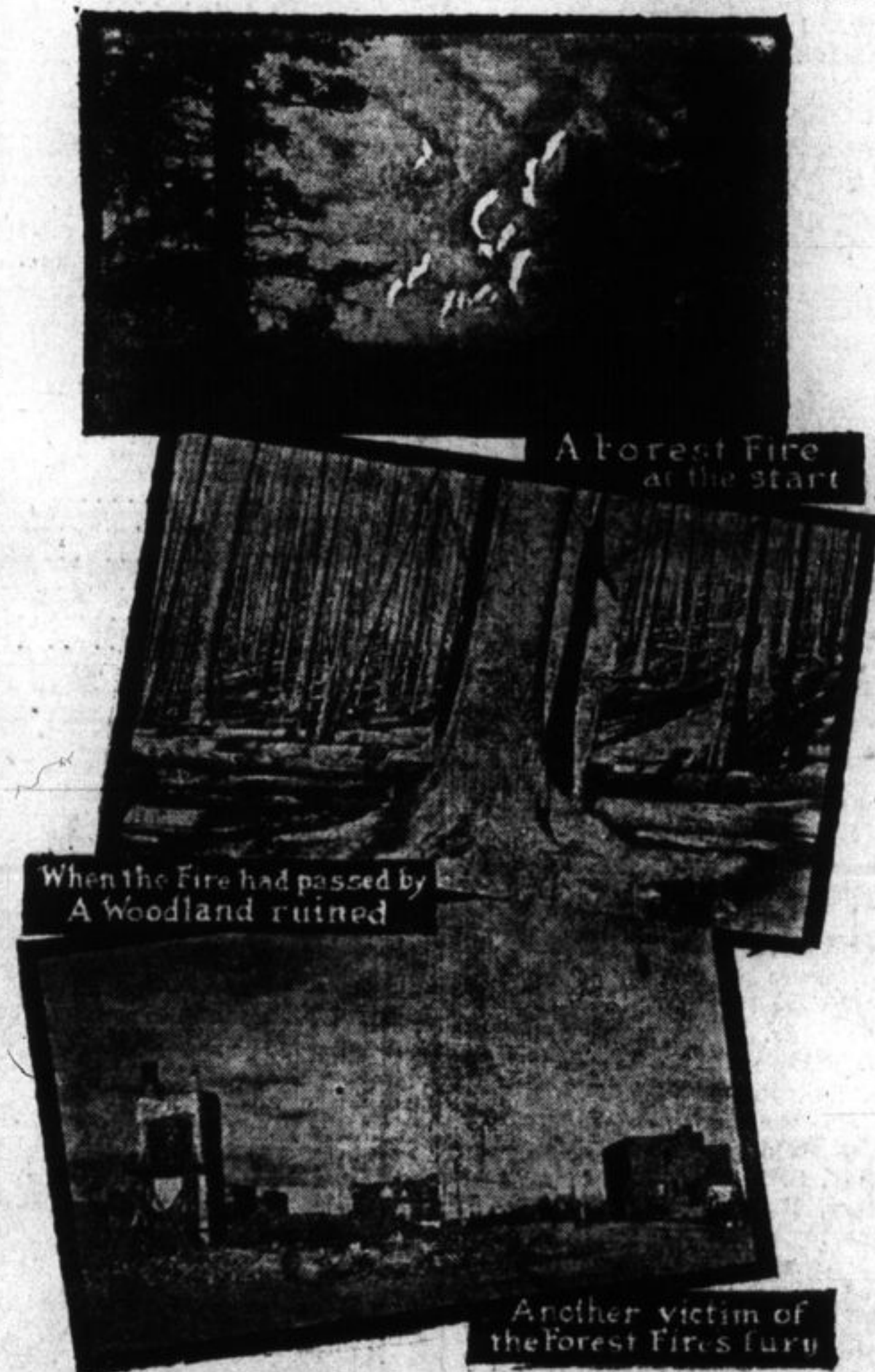

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## Who Pays For Our Forest Fires?



With the whole commercial world standing at Canada's counter asking for her pulpwood and timber and ready to establish new industries, new towns and new pay-lists, in what was yesterday a "wilderness," Dr. Clifton, D. Howe, president of the Canadian Forestry Association, points out that the Canadian people are setting 5,977 forest fires a year and burning up over 14 million dollars worth of public-owned forests. No public taxes will again be collected on these burned areas for the better part of a century and industries will have to look elsewhere for location.

Eighty-five per cent. of all the forest lands, Dr. Howe says, are owned by the people of Canada and the people pay by far the greater part of the penalties of forest destruction. It is estimated that four dollars out of every five received for a log are paid out for labor and supplies, while the remaining dollar is divided between the investor of capital and the government.

It is estimated that since Confederation the Canadian people have burned up more than 600,000 square miles of timber lands as compared with 100,000 square miles that have been laid low by the axe of the logger.

## A SLEEPING BUSHMAN PERISHES IN FLAMES

Campbell House Block Destroyed by Blaze That Has Disastrous Results.

Arnprior, Oct. 2.—Ivan Leblanc, a bushman from Kippewa, who was sleeping in the Campbell House, perished in a fire which broke out about one o'clock Sunday morning. The Campbell House block, which included the hotel, several stores and a laundry, was wiped out, the loss being in the neighborhood of \$75,000. Leblanc's charred body has been taken from the ruins. There were a number of guests in the hotel, but they escaped unharmed.

The Campbell House suffered a similar fate a few years ago and A. J. Campbell had it built up and had a new building with several stores in it. The building was a three storey structure and occupied a very prominent position in the business section of the town. Today it is a mass of ruins and leaves a big bare space in the town. Most of the places whose stock was damaged were covered by insurance.

Mr. Campbell's loss is about \$20,000 on which he has about \$9,000 insurance.

## BANKS FAVORABLE

To Paying Part of Home Bank Deposits Money.

Montreal, Oct. 2.—Interviewed here in regard to the Home Bank of Canada, Sir Frederick Williams Taylor, general manager of the Bank of Montreal and president of the Canadian Bankers Association, issued the following statement:

"The Bankers of Canada at large have not definitely agreed to undertake to advance to the curator the funds required to pay Home Bank depositors twenty-five cents on the dollar, secured by an assignment of assets of the Home Bank. On the other hand they have favorably considered the matter and may probably make an advance if and when the legal formalities have been satisfied."
