#### "ST. ELMO" AT ALLEN

##### STORY OF GREAT LOVE

One of the most engrossing examples of "double exposure" in pictures is to be seen with dramatic effect in the William Fox screen version of Augusta J. Egan's popular novel, "St. Elmo," which comes to the Allen theatre to-day for a three day run, with John Gilbert starring in the title role.

John Gilbert, as St. Elmo, stands on the garden edge and sees with startled eyes that narrow slowly in cruel decision at woman's faithlessness his sweetheart in the arms of his best friend. Only a few minutes before she had given herself to his arms.

Her lips had pressed his. She had said "yes" to him. He returned to find her plotting his destruction with the man he had always considered his friend.

And as St. Elmo stands there, hidden by the overhanging boughs of a large oak, his boyish pleasure in life crumbles and in its stead there enters a rankling hatred and bitterness. Jerome Storm directed the picture, and Jules Furthman made the screen adaptation.

### SPORTING NEWS

#### Cadets Work Hard Despite Setbacks

The R.M.C. cadets, in spite of a good deal of physical work in connection with cavalry drill, are working hard for the first intercollegiate intermediate fixture of the 1923 football season in Kingston.

The cadets' senior team has suffered a good many casualties in the last ten days amongst their first line players. Black, who was playing outside wing, is suffering from an injury to his back and will probably be out of his game for two or three weeks. McLeod, the snap back, had his nose broken in the practice game held between Queen's first yesterday afternoon and will also be debarred from playing for probably three weeks. Tremaine, who played for the team against Limestone on Saturday last, is suffering from an injury to his hip, but it is hoped that he will have recovered shortly.

There are several other players also suffering from minor injuries. In consequence, the cadets' team will probably be weakened considerably, but they hope to put up a good account of themselves.

Both in the Limestone's game and in the practice against Queen's, four different plays only were used, and the cadets this year have a fairly good string of trick plays which they hope will prove of some surprise to their opponents.

In spite of the fact that Queen's has such a number of players turning out and that their intermediates will be exceptionally strong this year, the cadets hope to retain the championship which they won last year, and will certainly make every endeavor to keep the intermediate cup at the college.

Winnipeg, Oct. 4.—Great amusement was provided Lord Renfrew last night, when the art students of Manitoba University, in "evening dress" and full war paint, marched to the home of Sir Augustus Nanton, where he was the honored guest at dinner, in connection with initiation parade of freshmen. The students extended greetings in the form of vociferous "Ijias," "rip rams" and songs in which merry allusions were made to the royal guest.

Entering into the spirit of the students, Lord Renfrew left the brilliant ball room for the verandah and, after shaking hands and chatting with several, he asked the leaders to give all the Varsity students his good wishes.

In the course of the afternoon and evening a number of dissatisfied British harvesters in the city formed a parade and endeavored to make representations to Lord Renfrew regarding getting transportation back to Great Britain. Through his secretary, he agreed to meet the representatives of the men this morning.

#### The Hotel Question.

A meeting of the hotel committee was held in the Board of Trade rooms Thursday morning for the purpose of hearing reports on the progress made, and Ald. W. P. Peters, chairman of the civic committee, reported that negotiations were proceeding with the United Hotels Company with a view to the building of a hotel in Kingston. No provisional agreement has yet been reached, and he was not, therefore, in a position to lay any definite proposal before the committee, but he hoped to be able to have a representative of the company present at the next meeting.

#### BOO-HOO ESCAPED BUT WAS RECAPTURED

Queen's Mascot Played High Jinks While She Had Freedom.

Queen Boo-Hoo, the pet bear mascot of Queen's senior rugby team, who spent the summer months on a farm near Bath, made a successful escape from her quarters and during her short period of freedom, caused a great deal of amusement.

While her guardian was away for the day, Boo-Hoo broke her chain and wandered to a nearby woods, where she was located the following morning. After breaking the chain, the bear climbed a telephone pole and while up the pole she gave a passing farmer quite a scare. The man was driving in a buggy. The horse became frightened at the dark object up the pole, and turned the buggy into the ditch, but fortunately the driver was not seriously injured.

When the bear was unleased from the farm, a careful search was made the following morning. Shortly after entering the woods the farmer, who is keeping the bear, "spotted" her hiding behind a large stump of a tree. After being chased for about an hour, Boo-Hoo returned to her quarters without any trouble.

It is expected that Boo-Hoo will be brought to the city the first of the week. It was the intention to take the bear to Montreal on Saturday, but she has grown to such a size that the cage which was made last year is not large enough for her.

#### PINCHED HER CHEEKS AND TRIED TO KISS HER

Charge Against Citizen Was Dismissed in the Police Court.

"I would not like to hang a dog on evidence of this kind," remarked Magistrate Farrell in the police court on Thursday morning, after he had heard evidence in the case of a citizen who was charged with "assaulting and ill-treating" a young married woman. Three-quarters of an hour was taken up in hearing the case, which was booked several days ago, and enlarged.

The woman in the case purchased a dress from the accused, and some time after the purchase, the plaintiff stated that she asked her to clerk in his store. She claimed that on the morning she went to take the position the accused pinched her on the cheeks and tried to kiss her, and that she had to fight ten or fifteen minutes with him before she could get away, and then she ran out of the store.

A sister of the plaintiff said she was in the shop at the time and noticed the accused put his arm around her sister and try to kiss her. Her sister struggled with the accused and got away.

The accused went into the witness box on his own behalf. He denied the charge that he had pinched the accused on her cheeks and that he had tried to kiss her. Further, he denied the statement that he had hired the plaintiff. He did not want her to work in his shop. He said that the woman had purchased a dress, and that he had on several occasions asked her for the money as the dress had not been paid for.
