He has been wandering around Kingston for several days, and the police have had several complaints about him. He was given protection at the police station two nights during last week.

Suing for Separation.

Adding to Equipment.
 The T. and N. O. R.R. has ordered three more locomotives with "booster" equipment from the Locomotive Works at \$75,000 each, as supplementary to their present equipment. The new engines are the Mikado type, and are to be delivered before Christmas. Asked whether they were intended to replace any of the engines at present in the service, Superintendent Lee stated that the new locomotives would represent purely additional equipment, and were being provided in anticipation of extraordinary heavy winter traffic this year.

Cheese Market Drops Further.
 E. W. Jackson, Gananoque Road, who is the auctioneer of the Brockville cheese board, was in Kingston on Saturday and he says that he did not get a bid from the export dealers last week although he offered for sale 2,300 boxes of cheese. One American buyer was present and offered 23 cents but it was not acceptable. This is the first time in the history of the Brockville board that cheese could not be sold. The reason given is the dull market in Britain where the bulk of Ontario cheese is sold, but it is a well known fact that the exporters bought during July and August at high prices when the indications pointed to a considerable

reduction in production. Since then there has been an actual increase in the output of the factories and the trade finds a surplus over the anticipated demands.
