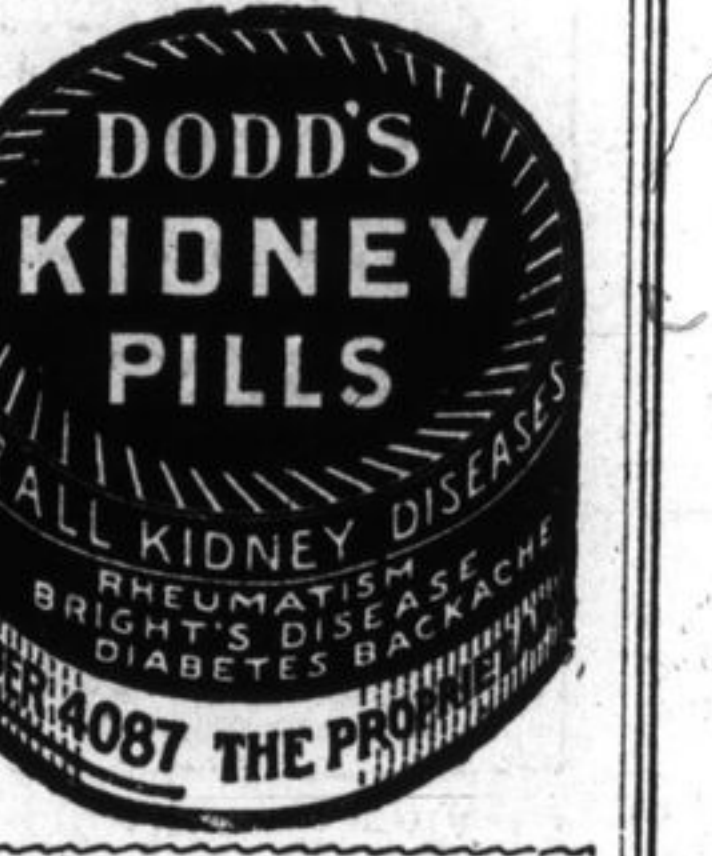
To Be Removed to Wellington.

him to the house for a few days, but did not prevent him from taking his share in the services at the Baptist church on Sunday.

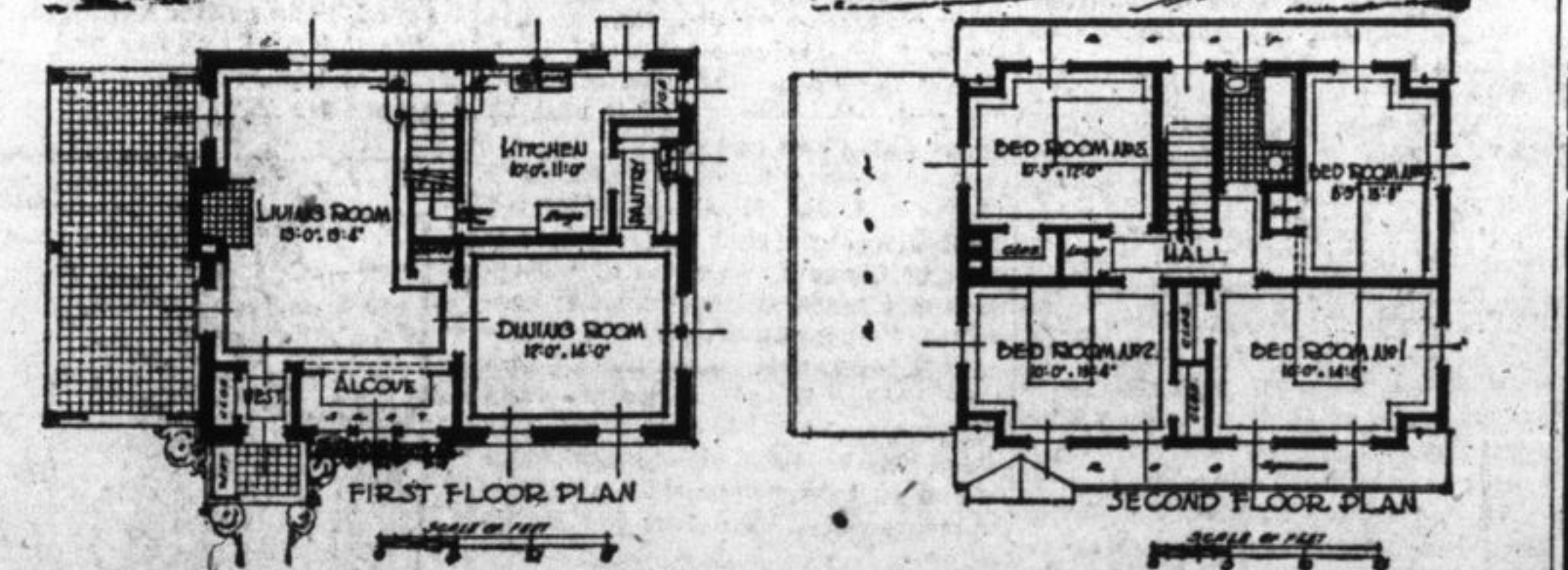
Curling Rink to be Built.

A Livable Dutch Colonial House

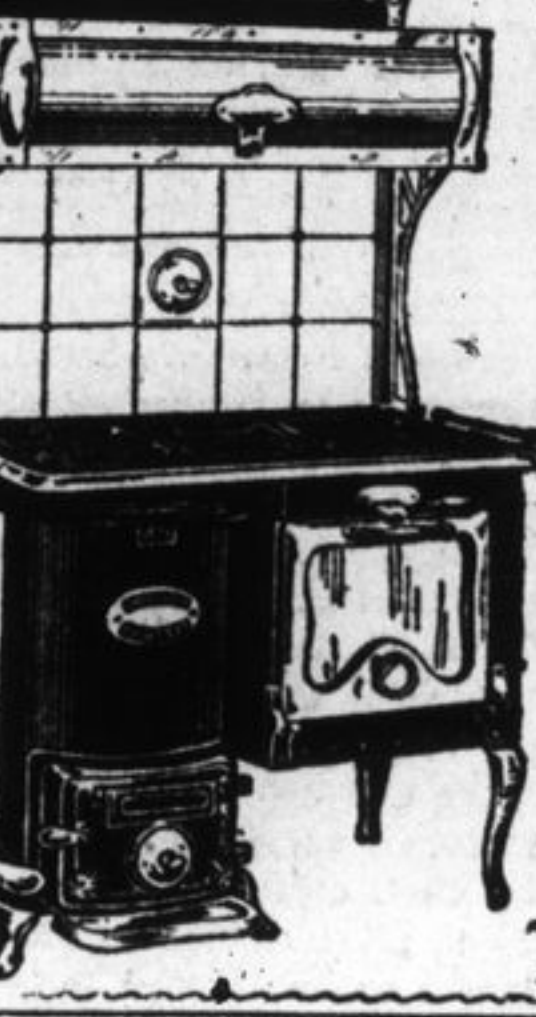


This house reflects the good living of old Colonial times. A large living-room with an open fireplace where the family congregates, a charming nook with comfortable seats and a group of windows where one may retire with a book or enjoy the flowers that bloom in the large boxes beneath the windows; this is a real living-room that is true to its name. A small entrance vestibule gives the required privacy, a good size dining-room with ample windows and a convenient kitchen and pantry that are both completely equipped; these, with the large living porch complete an ideal arrangement for the first floor. Easy stairs lead from the living-room to the second storey, while the cellar stairs lead down from the kitchen. The steps from the main stairs to the kitchen have a door at the landing, thus giving privacy and at the same time allowing the use of these stairs from the kitchen, a great convenience to the housewife. On the second storey we have a most compact arrangement with four good bedrooms and a bath conveniently arranged about a small central hall. Every foot of space is utilized. Each bedroom has a generous closet and a linen closet is provided off the hall. Plenty of closets make the housework easy by providing a place for everything and everything in its place—order being a prime requisite to good housekeeping. Numerous large windows give light and cheerful interiors, while the small panes carry out the old Colonial spirit of the design and give a distinctive character to the house. The house has modern plumbing, steam heat, electric light and gas. A laundry and other utility rooms are provided in the cellar. Cost about \$8,200.
