most approved method today is the following: To keep rain water in good condition, first have a cut-off in the pipe so that the first fall of rain, for about half an hour, may be prevented from going into the cistern and carrying with it the dust from the roof; after the half hour, open the passageway so that the rain may go from the roof into the cistern, and let it go through a filter, such as a hoghead filled with gravel and pieces of charcoal, mixed. The charcoal purifies the water.

The edible artichoke is the French (or Globe) artichoke and the Jerusalem Artichoke. To cook them cut half the stems off the bottom leaves, strip off the withered outer leaves until they begin to feel tender, then eat the artichoke in cold water containing a little vinegar for 30 minutes. Wash well and boil till tender in salted water. Drain and serve hot with drawn butter, French Dressing, Hollandaise Sauce or a white sauce.

Answer: No, it is not good form to serve layer cake at breakfast. Paper napkins are convenient to use for picnics or at such a time of upheaval in the house—such as when moving, when housecleaning or when there is illness. But people do not often use them regularly, even for home meals. Japanese crepe napkins (blue and white) are used by many housewives because they are the easiest to launder—simply require washing, and no ironing. As to the cistern charcoal, the

And perhaps there is no garment which has given to women more freedom than the garment known as "bloomers."

"Bloomer," strange as it may seem, was the name of a very brilliant and for the time in which she lived, a very "advanced" and daring woman.

This is her history. In Homer, New York, in the year 1813 was born Amelia Jenks Bloomer.

Amelia grew up as her girl friends did, attending school and going to parties, but Amelia was different. Amelia was a free spirit with thoughts ahead of her time.

So ambitious was she that after her marriage she entered upon a business career, which in those days

As was usually the case with the pioneers of woman suffrage, Amelia Bloomer worked also for the cause of temperance. She went about the country preaching for the emancipation of women and for national prohibition.

Not only was Amelia Bloomer in favor of these two reforms, but she was also in favor of freedom of dress for women.

The idea of divided skirts was originated by Miss Elizabeth Smith Miller, but it was Amelia Bloomer who carried out the idea and tried to popularize the garment now known as "bloomers," so that all women could have comfort in dress.

Amelia Bloomer adopted this mode of dress herself and appeared in it on her lecture tours. This greatly shocked most of the women and men of her day and caused her to be

spoken of in any but complimentary terms.

But Amelia Bloomer is one of the women to whom all the women of our day should be grateful. For she was one of those brave, fearless souls who fought for what they thought right and through whose efforts women have attained a place in the world in which they work shoulder to shoulder with men.

If Amelia Bloomer could see today what has taken place in the country she loved and for which she worked, what pleasure would be hers! She would know that in the Constitution of the United States there is not only an amendment prohibiting the manufacture and sale of strong drink, but that women vote. And not only do they vote, but many of them now wear, when they go for a hike in the country or indulge in some sport, the garment that bears her name.
