TRYING TO LOCATE KIN OF DEAD MAN

Ira Patterson, Aged 76, Died at General Hospital on Saturday.

The authorities at the General Hospital are endeavoring to locate relatives of the late Ira Patterson, aged seventy-six years, who died at the hospital on Saturday last, following an illness extending over six months.

Hoffman, Moscow, have learned that the black duck No. 101841, was banded on February 1st, 1923, at Union Springs, N.Y., by D. Beyon, who was operating at that point for Dr. A. A. The information furnished them regarding its capture was very valuable and appreciative, enabling them to advance the important investigation relative to the migration and life histories of their native birds.
