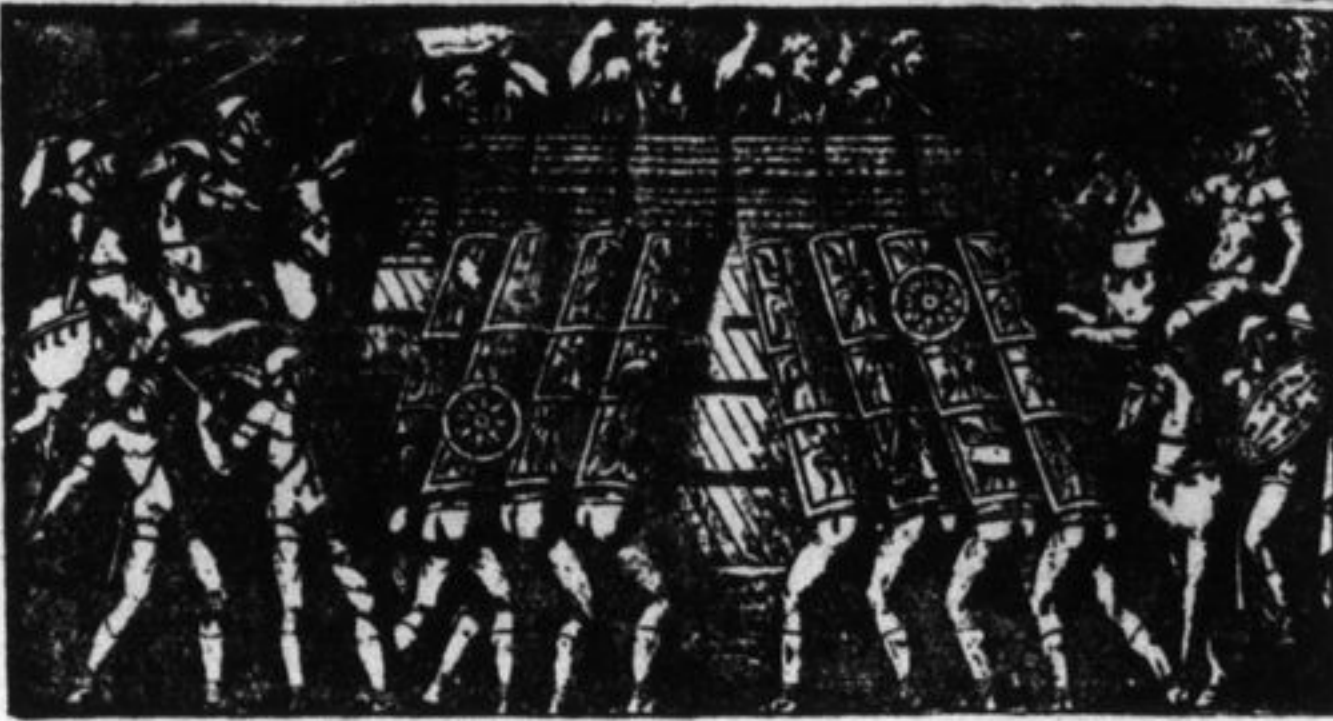

**Moving Roofs of Shields.**  
 It is too bad the Romans spent so much of their time and energy making war and getting ready for war. A great deal of cleverness was stored in the heads of the leaders. This cleverness might have been used to do something worth while. Instead it was used to figure out better ways of killing.  
 Yesterday I told you about the clever battering ram idea. Today, we have a picture which illustrates another idea. Groups of soldiers fixed their shields together so they could not be hurt when they came to attack a city.  
 In each group there were dozen men. You can count their shields in the picture, which shows an attack on a certain town.  
 The defenders are hurling all sorts of things against the Romans. If you look closely, you can see on top of the shields two wheels, two torches and a short sword. You may also notice a pot from which boiling oil appears to be flowing. All these things fail to hurt the soldiers, who are protected by the entire "roofs."  
 To the right and left are Roman cavalymen. It is hard to see why they are galloping toward the wall in such an open way. Perhaps it is because this wall is lower than usual, and they hope to kill the defenders with their long spears before harm comes to themselves.  
 At the lower left, you can see two men with torches. They want to set fire to the walls, which in this case were largely made of woven twigs.

### Fire Makes Girl Rich Heiress.

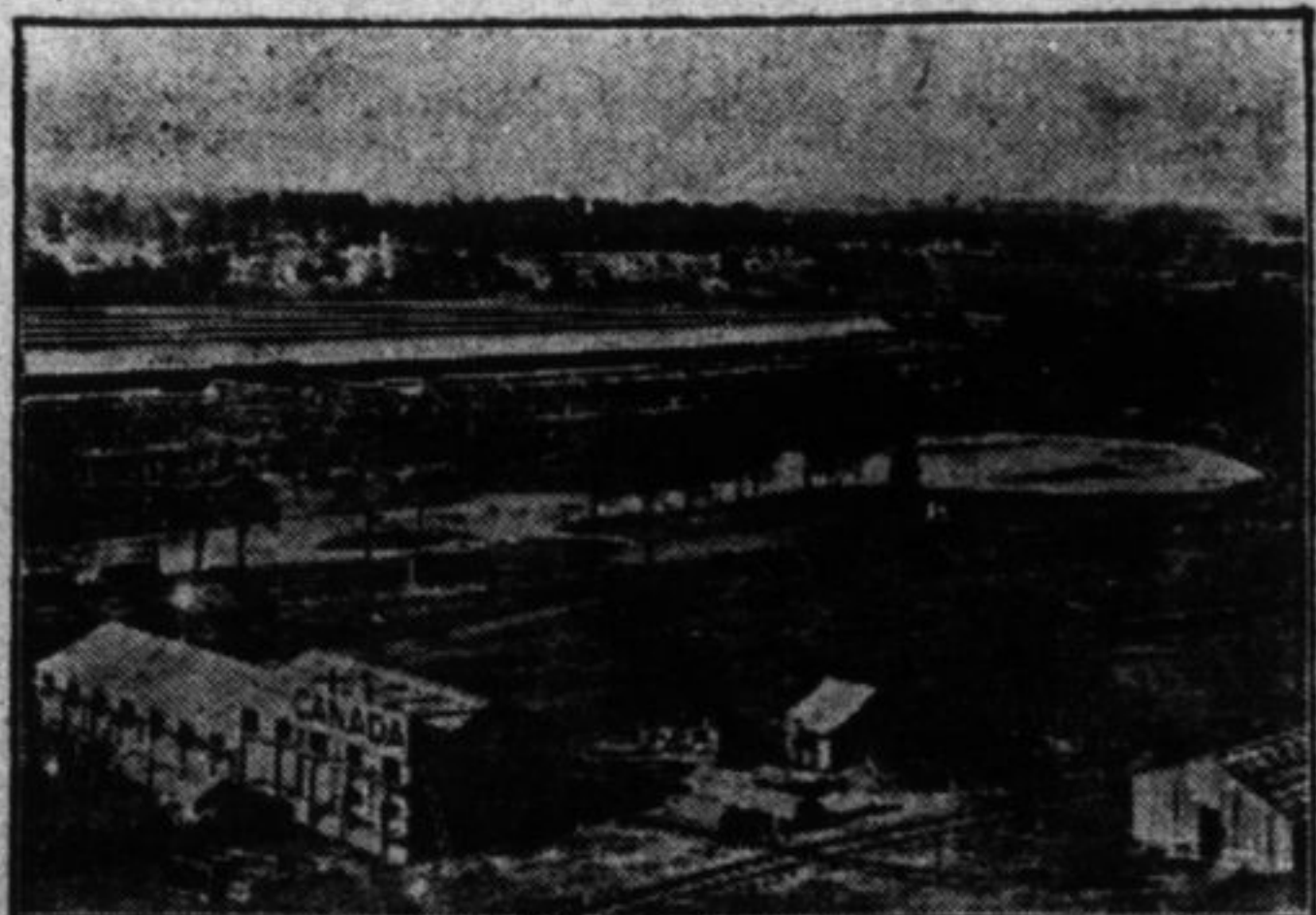
New York, Oct. 18.—Erma Andrews, aged eighteen, who was away from her Bensonhurst, Brooklyn home visiting friends when fire swept it killing six persons, including her sister and brother, was named sole legatee in the will of Francis L. Fowler, wealthy oil man, formerly of Tampico, Mexico, who also died in the flames, it was learned when the document was filed for probate in Brooklyn. Miss Andrews' mother sustained serious injuries when she leaped from the third floor of the burning dwelling. The estate is estimated at not less than \$100,000.

### Canada's Arsenic Output.

Ottawa, Oct. 18.—White arsenic, made from ores, was the most important item in productions of non-metallic minerals throughout Canada during 1922, according to the Dominion bureau of statistics. The quantity turned out last year was 2,576 tons, with a value of \$321,037. The output in 1921 was 1,935 tons.

### To Run Alberta Wheat Pool.

Calgary, Oct. 18.—Chester M. Elliott, manager of the grain commission department of the United Grain Growers, has accepted the position as manager of the Alberta wheat pool, and will assume his new duties immediately. 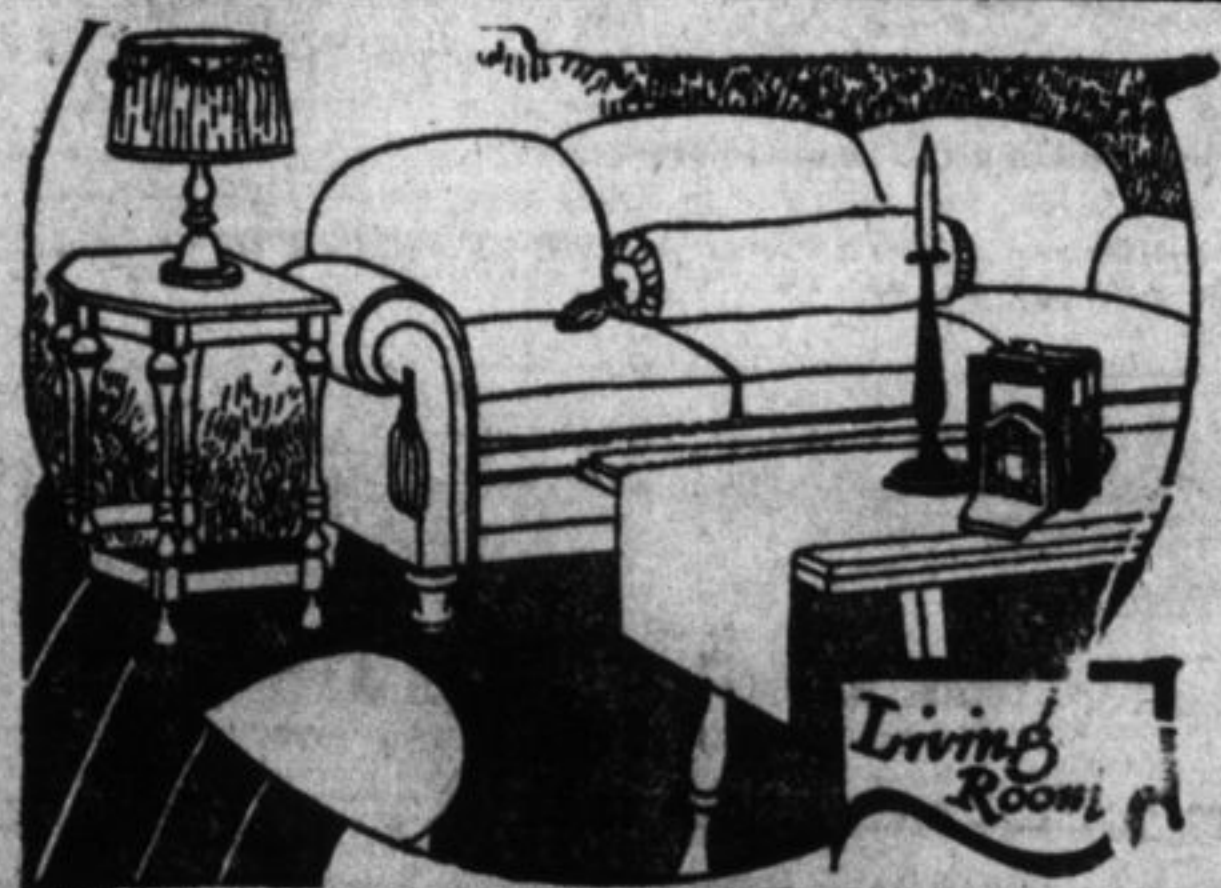
