Murroll slipped on the narrow stairway as the prisoners were being led back to their cell below, and he fell heavily forward, dragging Williams, to whom he was handcuffed, and chained, after him. Governor Dawson was in the lead, and the combined weight of the men fell upon him. Though taken by
