man's Lodge and this organization had charge of the services at the grave. He is survived by his widow, two daughters, Regina and Frances, and one son, James, Alexandria Bay.

W.M.S. Convention.
The annual convention of the Napanee district, Tamworth division, of the Woman's Missionary Society was held in the Methodist church, Camden East, Oct. 9th. Mrs. J. W. Wagar was re-elected superintendent of Tamworth branch and Mrs. Moss as assistant superintendent.

Appointed Chief Engineer.
Kenneth M. Cameron, a graduate of the Royal Military College, has been named chief engineer of the Department of Public Works, to succeed the late Arthur St. Laurent. Mr. Cameron will assume his duties almost immediately. He was educated at Strathroy, London, and Toronto. Varsity and McGill, where he took the degrees of B.Sc. and M.Sc. From September, 1918, up to the present he has been assistant chief engineer.

Better Mail Delivery.
An endeavor is being made to have a better mail delivery in Kingston, there being many complaints about people not receiving their mail from Saturday morning till Tuesday, when Monday is observed as a holiday. The suggestion has been made that when a holiday falls on Monday, the letter carriers would deliver mail on the Saturday-afternoon preceding, instead of being off duty and observe their holiday on the Wednesday of that week. For instance, Monday, Nov. 12th, has been set aside as Thanksgiving Day. Mail could be delivered on Saturday afternoon, Nov. 10th, and on the following Wednesday, the postal carriers could have a holiday. Such a scheme as this is also being advocated in Brockville. Postmaster W. E. Manhard, Brockville, went to Ottawa and took the matter up with the department.
