 Though his new boss is a tyrant, the circus has its compensation. There is Luigi, the old clown, who takes him under his protective wing, and then there is Jeannette, Luigi's niece, the tiny equestrienne star of the circus.
 The big denouement comes when Toby tries to aid Jeannette and suddenly finds himself a star of the circus instead of merely a peanut merchant.
 "Circus Days" is a production dear after the heart of any boy—or girl, whether six or sixty. It is one of the finest things the screen has ever produced.

TOM MIX AND TONY PLEASE LOCAL FANS.
 A large percentage of Kingston's film fans have a warm spot in their hearts for Tom Mix, and for Tony, his handsome and clever steed. And they, the fans, gathered in force last night to see Tom's first big comedy special, "Soft Boiled." Appreciation was the keynote of the reception they gave the picture, and the appreciation grew from the first reel to the last. The story, the acting, the scenes and settings, the witty titles, all go to form a film production that rivals some of the biggest and best in interest and appeal.
