Style and good taste are wanting in this age of cinema and yellow press. The finest antidote for such is back in the Psalms and the Prophets, back to the ancient and stately rendering.

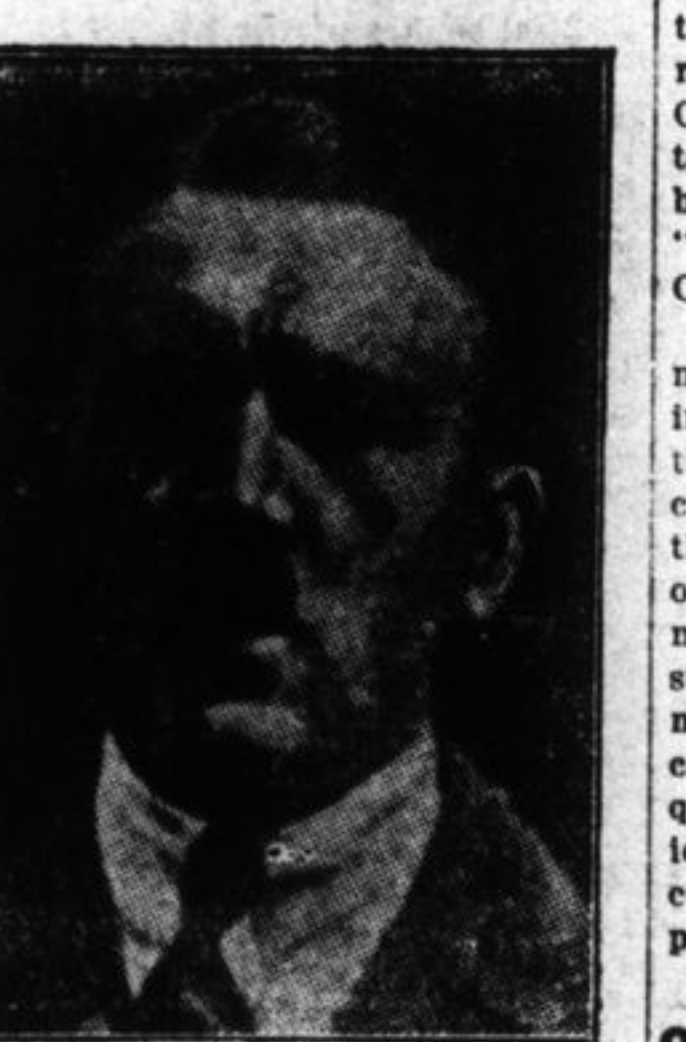
"SILENCE" IN CHURCH ON ARMISTICE DAY

QUEBEC FARMERS GO TO THE LUMBER CAMPS

A Party of Five Hundred, With Their Horses, Leave the Capital.

Quebec, Oct. 20.—Attracted by the good wages paid in lumber camps near Ville Marie, Haliburton, and Kippawa, by the Rionden interests, five hundred young farmers, residing mostly in Champlain county, left this city today by the Canadian National Railway.

This is a record number of men leaving here at one time for lumber camps. The majority are taking their own horses.

WILL CEASE BUYING CATTLE FOR EXPORT

Decision Reached by British and U.S. Packers in Buenos Aires.

Buenos Aires, Oct. 20.—British and United States meat packing companies here decided to cease buying cattle for export because of the recently enacted law compelling them to buy from producers at fixed minimum prices.

WILL CONSULT WITH NICKLE

In Regard to Dominion Co-Operation Over Racing.

STATEMENT FROM OTTAWA

By Under-Secretary of State Over the Extension of Rights.

Ottawa, Oct. 20.—Assurance that the federal government would consult with the attorney-general of Ontario before making any further changes in charters of Ontario racing clubs, was given by Thomas Mulvey, under secretary of state, today, in reply to complaints by Hon. W. F. Nickle, attorney general of Ontario, regarding lack of co-operation by the federal government in the restriction of racing.

Mr. Nickle complained that in connection with the London Jockey Club Limited a dominion charter issued in 1921 was amended on September 10th last, extending the right of the club to hold race meets.

Mr. Mulvey said that the amendments rectified improper restrictions in the original charter. He stated that it is customary for all dominion charters to give powers throughout the whole of Canada, and while the original wording of the charter was made on the application of the club, subsequent representations had been made to the department that it was causing the club a loss and a request had been made for the inclusion in the charter of the wording customary in other similar letters patent.

RESENT INTERFERENCE OF AUSTRALIAN PREMIER

London, Oct. 20.—Dominion interference in the fiscal policy of the Mother Country was strongly resented by Lord Beauchamp, president of the Free Trade Union, at a meeting of the union here last night.
