



Makes It Impossible for Children to Secure the Proper

New York, Oct. 23 .- Daylightsaving has proved harmful to the health of New York's children, because it makes it impossible for them to secure proper rest and relaxation during the season when it is needed most. This declaration by Dr. E. Willis

Kobler, of the Department of Health was induced by an examination of 5,600 children in the schools maintained in poorer sections of the city by the Children's Aid Society, in an effort to establish the causes of illness and undernourishment.
