#### SUPREME COURT CASES.

To Be Heard Next Week by Justice Smith.

The following is the docket of civil cases entered for trial at the non-jury sittings of the supreme court of Ontario to be held for the county of Frontenac at the court house commencing Monday, Nov. 12th. The court will be adjourned to Tuesday, owing to Monday being Thanksgiving Day. Hon. Justice Smith will preside.

J. J. Shortell et al, plaintiffs; vs. Eilen Draper. The plaintiff's claim is against the defendant as endorser of a promissory note for \$1,600 and interest. Nickle and Farrell for plaintiffs, and Rigney and Hickey for defendant.

Isaac Cohen & Co., plaintiffs; and J. D. Godkin, defendant. The plaintiffs claim the sum of \$1,036.38, balance due for the use and occupation of the premises, No. 290 Princess street, for twenty-three months. Cunningham and Smith for the plaintiffs, and Rigney and Hickey for the defendant.

"Red" McKelvey is acclaimed the greatest line plunger in the college union, and Brian Timmis is admitted to be the best ground gainer in the Big Four on bucking. The duel between these players will make a wing line attraction out of the ordinary.

Queen's have been stating that Harding has not been missed. The latter has come along to be one of team after his slow start. There is no doubt that he will do his utmost to show his Kingston supporters that he is as good a player as last year if not better. Ottawas will practice hard all week and it is likely that Ste. Germaine will be played as well as young Anderson the flashy New Edinburgh quarter.
