Nor was her popularity confined to the American metropolis. Her visit to this country won the people of the United States so completely that even now thirty, years after her golden voice has been silenewa by death, tales still are told of her sweetness and beauty.

The "Swedish Nightingale" was the daughter of a somewhat obscure teacher of languages. Those who hold to the theory of reincarnation often cite her as proof of their since her knowledge of music appeared to be inborn, and demonstrated even before she could spean, At the age of three Jenny Lind could repeat a song once heard, with remarkable exactness. When she was nine she began the study of music at Stockholm. Three years later her upper notes lost their sweetness, and then came a time of depression amounting almost to despair for the small girl and those who had entertained high hope for her. But the golden quality returnas suddenly as it had gone when she was sixteen. It was then that she was sent to Paris to become a

pupil of Garcia, Oddly enough her appearance was against her at the beginning of her career, for Jenny Lind was anything but an attractive child. She was awkward and shy to such a degree that those who had to do with the stage declared that never, never would the public accept such

raucherie! But her lack of physical charm was metamorphosed by the years, and in 1850 her fame as a vocalist extended throughout Europe.

It was in that year that an enterrising showman-none other than P. T. Barnum-decided the time had come to bring to his own country the Scandinavian song-bird. She consented to cross the ocean and was billed to appear in New York. A bit doubtfully at first but with
