SPORTING NEWS

R.M.C. VS. ST. MICHAEL'S Finals, Nov. 14th in Toronto and Nov. 17th in Kingston.

A great deal of difficulty has been experienced at the R.M.C. in arranging for the intermediate finals. R. M. C. played their last game against McGill on Oct. 27th, and tried to arrange for the first of the finals on Nov. 3rd in Toronto. The rules for competition lay down that winners in the intermediate groups must be declared on that date.

In the western group there was a three-cornered tie this year, however, and on Nov. 3rd, O. A. C., Varsity II and St. Michael's were tied for first place. Mr. Weaver, president of the C.I.R.F.U., is also convener for the western group, and it was arranged with him that R.M.C. would play the winners of the tie in Toronto or Guelph on Nov. 10th, with the second game in Kingston on Nov. 17th. Through the kindness of Queen's, R.M.C. had been able to arrange for the stadium for that date. On Nov. 6th a meeting was held in Toronto to arrange for the play-off of the three-cornered tie, and it is understood that all three teams agreed that whichever of them won would play R.M.C. on their home grounds on 10th November, and in Kingston on 17th November. R. M. C. was officially informed of this by letter.

St. Michael's defeated O.A.C. 6-4 on Nov. 6th, and Varsity II 8-7 on Nov. 8th after twenty minutes overtime. St. Michael's were somewhat battered after their two games, and as a result made efforts to have the game fixed for the 10th November altered. R.M.C. on the 9th had had no football for two weeks, and were in a bad state owing to lack of matches. They stated to the C.I.R.F.U. that they considered the 10th November date ought to be adhered to, as that date had been fixed. The cadets were due for Thanksgiving leave on the 10th, and the team were to miss some of this leave in order to play the game off. All arrangements had been made to go to Toronto on that date. R.M.C. stated that their case had been placed before Mr. Weaver, and that they would have accepted any decision he gave, as it was given in their favor they would be ready to play in Toronto on the 10th. St. Michael's then stated they could not play on that date.

R.M.C. were not willing to be defeated on the part of St. Michael's and suggested that they would play in Toronto on the 14th, and in Kingston on the 17th. After a further delay St. Michael's unwillingly accepted this decision.

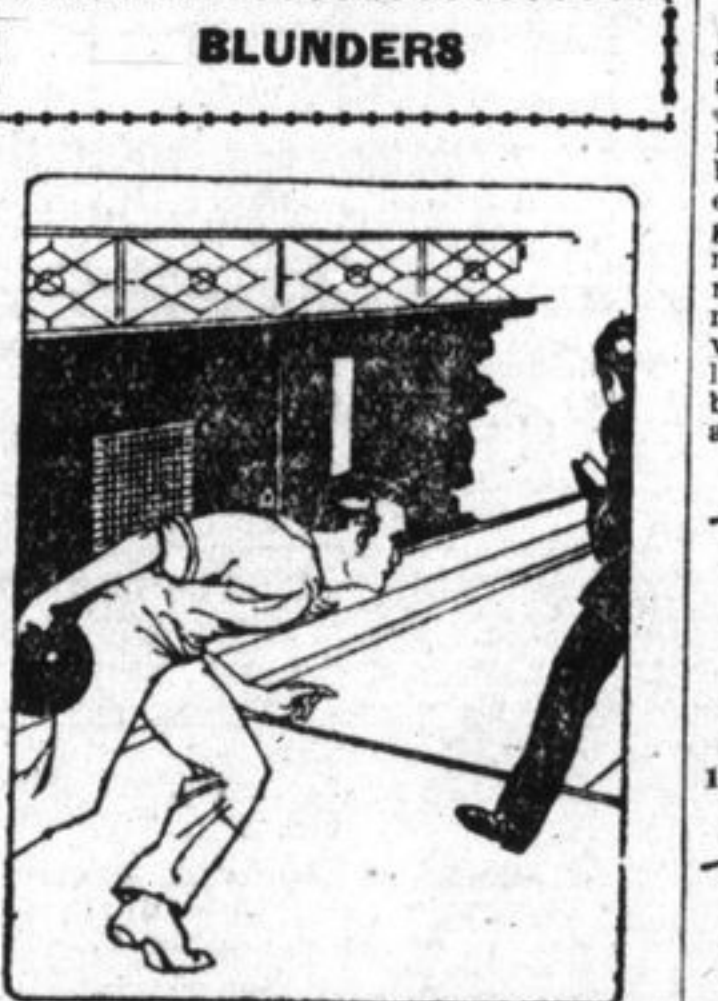

SATURDAY'S MARKET.

Saturday morning's market was a bumper one and fowls ruled in quantity once again. Large-sized, mature fowl were sold from 70c to \$1.00 each; chickens brought \$1.50 to \$2.00 a pair; ducks were offered at \$1.00 to \$1.25 each; pork stayed steady at 15c and 17c a pound. Butter clung to what has become an almost year-round level when the vendors asked 40c, 43c, and 45c a pound. Eggs, disdaining common everyday height, jumped to 70c a dozen but were going as low as 60c by noon. Chrysanthemums threw a splash of color over the scene and were quickly bought up. Fresh lake whitefish, pike and salmon were sold on one corner, and mushrooms and canned honey were two more novelties to break the ordinary run.

Notice of By-Law A By-law to ratify and confirm an Agreement with Frederick William Attack, Doctor of Science, of the Town of Arnprior, County of Renfrew, Manufacturer, and the Company he proposes to incorporate.

WHEREAS it is deemed expedient and in the interests of the City and for the promotion of manufacturing in the Municipality to enter into the Agreement hereto annexed and to grant the land and the exemptions from taxation herein set forth and to grant such running rights as are held by the Corporation on a Railway siding as herein provided. BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Council of the Corporation of the City of Kingston, as follows:— The said Corporation is hereby directed and empowered to enter into the contract with the said Frederick William Attack hereto annexed as part of this By-law, and after its corporate seal, and to bind thereby this Corporation to the terms and conditions therein contained. This By-law shall take effect on the day of the passing thereof subject to its being assented to by the electors.

Synopsis of Agreement The Corporation agrees to give exemption from all taxes on this site and all buildings which are erected, and on business tax including the school tax nor local improvement tax and will give a further exemption of ten years from the amount of the rate of the By-law, and have given to the Corporation that the stock of the Company of the par value of not less than \$150,000 has been subscribed and not less than \$100,000 paid thereon. The Corporation agrees to spend a further sum of \$25,000 for the same purpose during the expiration of the time stipulated by the By-law, and in default of this expenditure being made all exemptions from taxes to which the company would be entitled shall forthwith cease. The Corporation shall not later than one year after the expiration of the time stipulated for the expenditure of the first sum of \$25,000 and two years after the expiration of the time stipulated for the further sum of \$25,000 furnish to the City Auditor a statutory declaration showing the amounts expended during these periods. The Corporation will permit the Company to use the lands and railway siding after the passing of this By-law, and to change, alter, remove or pull down all or any of the buildings now upon said lands. The agreement and the several terms, conditions and provisos shall be respectively binding upon the heirs, executors, administrators and assigns of the Company, and the successors and assigns of the Corporation. The votes of the electors of the Corporation of the City of Kingston shall be taken upon the proposed said By-law at the same time and at the same place as the annual elections for the Municipal Council and the Deputy Returning Officers appointed to hold such election, shall take the votes.
