A CROCHETED CHILD'S HAT: (Nine years size.) Crown: Ch. 3, join in ring, work 1 s. c. in ring. Row two: Work s. c. in each st. peat from * around. Row 4: 1 s.c. s.c. in next 2 sts:, repeat from around. Continue in this way, work- threads in both cases) and continue ing 2 s.c. in each of the seven widenings points, and having one more of plain buff-and-brown mixture to single crochet in each section every match the crown. Brush the hat, and row till work measures nine and one half inches in diameter. Then work 11 rows without increasing. Then decrease as follows: 1/2 Work 4 s.c. decrease next st., repeat from * till 82 sts. remain. Work 7 rows, then work brim as follows:




