Queen's And Tigers in Good Condition For To-Morrow's Great Football Battle

Queen's Lose Delehay But Have Good Substitutes—Tigers Reported in Fine Shape and Ready to Go the Limit—Capacity Crowd Expected at Richardson Stadium.

On the eve of the big battle for the championship of Eastern Canada and the right to defend the Dominion Football Championship against the western invaders, both Tigers and Queen's are reported to be in fine shape and ready to go the limit tomorrow.

Queen's worked out yesterday with R.M.C. and both squads licked into it with a will. Some of the finer and more complicated plays were tried by both squads and things ran very smoothly. All the Tricolor gang were in uniform but Delehay and Bond. Delehay's injury in Wednesday's heavy practice will keep him out of the big game and Adams will be at inside with Muirhead. Bond has been on the sick list for nearly a week now but it is expected that he will be fine by the time the big game hour rolls around.

Queen's will play their regular lineup with but one change. Balfour and Leadley will do the speed work with Mundell chipping in when occasion demands. Campbell will be a strong wing, Evans at quarter, as usual and Thomas and Walker as outsiders.

Art Lewis will have his chance to show whether Ernie Cox is a better snap than he is. Along the line McKelvey and Muirhead will be back at their places and Reynolds and Adams will make up the rest of the heavy brigade. McKelvey was out yesterday and, though a little stiff, should be in shape again for to-morrow.

Baldwin, Quinn, Gib, McKelvey, Airth, McNeill, Brown, Bond, Gronfin and Anglin will be on the bench and anxious to take part. Anglin received a nasty twist yesterday and it may hinder him slightly. However, Trainer Bill Hughes got at it right away and expects to have it all fixed by the morning.

From Hamilton comes reports that the Tigers will be in better shape than at any time this year. They will field their strongest team, and with such a big goal ahead, they will fight hard for every inch of ground and every possible advantage. The Tigers have a team that must not be underestimated. At first glance they do not look impressive but their work is altogether too determined and well-finished to be taken lightly. The men directing operations on the bench and on the field have had experience with the best senior teams in the country for years and they will have studied any possible weaknesses in the Tricolor machine. It is not going to be any walkover.

On the season's record and from the look of the two teams in action Queen's should win out. If they play the football of which they are capable they are almost certain winners. But given a high wind, a couple of injuries and an odd loose ball, Tigers will just tear in and annihilate anything that is in front of them. There is nothing very graceful about the way those Tigers go after loose balls, but their method is effective, to say the least, and in their last two important games they have gathered most of their points as the result of gathering in fumbles and loose ones. Bert Gibb is a consistent and strong kicker and he has two of the best outside wings in the game with him in Veale and Main.
