OBITUARY

Late Miss E. M. Litton.
Elsie May Litton, only child of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Litton, 188 Union street, passed away early Friday morning, after an illness extending over many months. She was born in Kingston in January, 1902, and attended the public schools and collegiate institute, leaving the latter in 1918, that she might do her part for king and country by home service in a local bank. Of a thoughtful, quiet disposition, she early in life showed a deep interest in things spiritual, and at the age of sixteen united with the First Baptist church, in which she became a valued teacher in the primary department of the Bible school, and an active useful worker in the Young People's Society, until failing health made it impossible for her to continue these activities. She will be greatly missed by a large circle of friends, with whom she was justly popular because of her quiet cheerfulness, and the warmth and sincerity of her friendships. The funeral, which will be private, will leave her parents' home at 2.30 o'clock Saturday afternoon. The funeral service at two o'clock will be conducted by her former pastor, Rev. Douglas Laing.
