1. The ministers will not be pledged to any system of Truth.

2. The ordained eldership will be dropped.

No other church has such a company of ordained men, banded together by the most sacred vows for service in the work of the Lord. This sheet-anchor of Presbyterianism will be bartered away for the "Committee man" of the new church.

3. The right of a congregation to " call " its own minister will be taken away.

Instead, there will be a "Settlement Committee" which may or may not grant the request or adhere to the wishes of a congregation. The right to "call" its own minister is a cherished and privilege of Presbyterian-

4. The right of a Presbytery to ordain and induct its ministers will be taken away.

This solemn and sacred privilege is highly prized by the Presbyterian

5. To exchange the Great Confession of Faith for this doctrinal compromise—the Basis of Union—is too big a price to pay for a so-called Union.


