L.Y.R.A. DECIDES TO HOLD ITS REGATTA AT SODUS

The Annual Meeting of the Association Held in Kingston Saturday.

The annual meeting of the Lake Yacht Racing Association, representing all the clubs on Lake Ontario, was held in Kingston on Saturday, at which representatives were present from the Royal Canadian Yacht Club, Queen City Yacht Club and National Yacht Club, all of Toronto; Rochester Yacht Club, Crescent Yacht Club, Watertown, N.Y.; Bay of Quinte Yacht Club, Belleville; Royal Hamilton Yacht Club, Hamilton. The meeting covered the routine business of the association, and was preceded by a dinner at which the delegates from the various clubs were the guests of the Kingston Yacht Club, and together with the sailing members of the yacht club, were dined at the Frontenac Club. Some amendments were made to the rating rules covering classes between 31 and 38-foot rating.

Rochester Yacht Club presented a request for the 1924 regatta, to be held at Sodus, and this was enthusiastically received and decided upon. The regatta at Sodus will be held on August 6th, 7th and 8th, and will be preceded by the race for the Ereman long distance cup. The race has now become a national event, the race being from Toronto to Rochester, and will be held on August 2nd.

It is many years since a regatta was held at Sodus, but old yachtsmen who have attended regattas in the past are enthusiastic over the selection, as an excellent harbor and every facility for a successful regatta will be provided.

Commodore C. H. Cook, of the Royal Hamilton Yacht Club was elected president; J. Barrows, of the Rochester Yacht Club, vice-president, and A. B. Boves, Toronto, secretary.
