He is a player who is constanly improving and even yet he has not reached the limit of his ability. His improve. ment during the past few years has been remarkable. A few years ago I was not able to depend on him to direct the infield play, but lately I have depended on him considerably for this important work.

"During the past season when Bancroft was forced out of the lineup for quite a time, his absence burt the team little if at all. This was due to the fact that Jack. son played such a splendid game at shortstop and also to the fact that Frisch had learned to direct the infield play and do it well. He showed splendid judgment and the infield worked just as smoothly as if Bancroft had been in the game."

QUEEN'S EQUAL REORD OF TORONTO VARSITY

Argonauts of Toronto Also Won Two Dominion Titles in Row.

When Queen's rugbyists crushing y defeated Regina, champions of Western Canada, at Toronto University stadium on Saturday, they won their second consecutive Dominion championship, an honor attained by only two other teams in the past twenty years. Toronto University being winners in 1909 and 1910, and foronto Argonauts taking the title in 1920 and 1921.

The Dominion rugby champtonship matches were placed on a permanent basis in 1892. Queen's annexed the honors in 1893, and a lapse of twenty-nine years occurred before they again connected last
