that he has already earned approximately \$60,000. Of this amount about \$15,000 was obtained through playing in the world's series of 1921, 1922 and 1923.

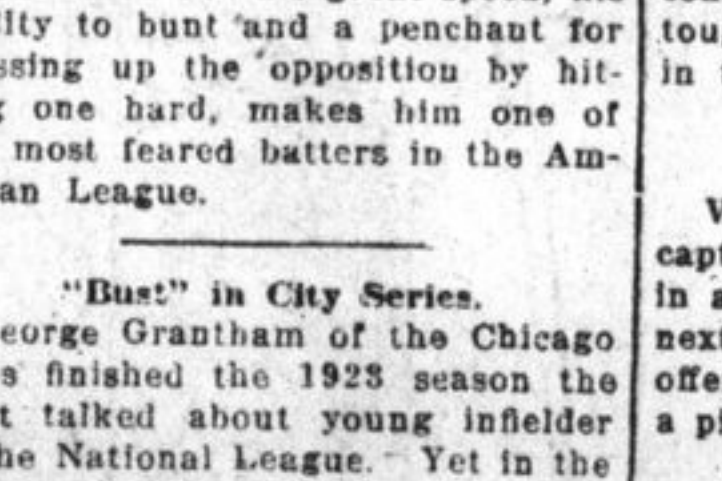
Before joining the Giants in the spring of 1919, Frisch was an all-around star at Fordham University. He was the best baseball player that has ever represented that Bronx institution.

Started Against the Reds. The Fordham Flash received his first real test as a major leaguer in August of that year. The Giants and the Cincinnati Reds were fighting for the league lead at the time.

During the past season when Bancroft was forced out of the lineup for quite a time, his absence hurt the team little if at all. This was due to the fact that Jackson played such a splendid game at shortstop and also to the fact that Frisch had learned to direct the infield play and do it well.

QUEEN'S EQUAL RECORD OF TORONTO VARSITY

The Argonauts of Toronto Also Won Two Dominion Titles in Row.

Ottawa Journal. When Queen's rugbyists crushing defeated Regina, champions of Western Canada, at Toronto University stadium on Saturday, they won their second consecutive Dominion championship, an honor attained by only two other teams in the past twenty years.

The record of the Kingston University in those three years follows: 1893—Queen's University (Ontario) defeated Montreal (Quebec) 29 to 11.

1922—Argonauts (Interprovincial) defeated Parkdale (Ontario) 20 to 1; Queen's University (Intercollegiate) defeated Argonauts (Interprovincial) 12 to 11; Queen's (Intercollegiate) defeated Edmonton Eskimos (Western Canada) 13 to 1.

1913—Hamilton Tigers (Interprovincial) defeated Hamilton Rowing Club (Ontario) 24 to 1; Queen's (Intercollegiate) defeated Hamilton (Interprovincial) 13 to 8; Queen's (Intercollegiate) defeated Regina (Western Canada) 54 to 0.

Since the organization of the Intercollegiate Rugby Football Union back in 1897, Queen's University won the championship in 1900, 1904, 1922 and 1923. When Queen's won the college title in 1904, no Dominion championship series was played that year.

LEADLEY CAPTAIN.

At a meeting of the Queen's rugby team held yesterday afternoon, Frank "Peps" Leadley was elected captain of the squad for next season.

"Peps" Leadley is one of the most popular players who has ever worn the Queen's uniform. He came to the local university three years ago and at once stood out as a senior football star.

He is in third-year science and will be in his final year during the term of his captaincy of the team.

Tough Job for Sisler. One of the first statements credited to Manager George Sisler of the Browns was his intention to start an intensive educational campaign with the players the moment they reported in the spring.

Stars on Diamond, Too. Vern Lewellen, quarterback and captain of Nebraska, may be seen in a major league baseball uniform next year, he having spurned two offers during the past summer.

Jack Beatty will be the manager of the London M.-O. Baseball team next year. This is now practically a certainty as Jack has accepted the terms offered by the London club.

FROM THE OUTSIDE—LOOKING IN.

It is announced that McGill's intercollegiate rugby team will meet the fast Dartmouth eleven on October 4th of next year, the game to be played under American rules.

Queen's have the enviable reputation of being unbeaten throughout the season and winning the Dominion rugby championship for the second consecutive year. They have played like "world beaters" all season and deserved the honors.

Frank Shaughnessy will manage the Syracuse Stars again next season, whether they are quartered in Syracuse or Montreal. "Shag" seems to keep busy pretty near all the year round.

Howie Milne, who was Regina's outstanding player against Queen's, is called the best all-round athlete of the western city. He was a member of the junior St. Pats. Regina hockey team last winter and this year will be on the defence of Regina senior amateur team.

The proposed sale of the "Bluenose" is a matter for regret and it is hoped that she will fall into the hands of sportsmen who will put her in next year's international race in an effort to wipe out the memory of the fiasco of this year.

Sports are said to be a live factor in the British election. To a certain degree they had an effect on Kingston's latest municipal election, though few people realize it.

"Babe" Dye will not play hockey for St. Pats. this season if he is sold to a major league club. It is a good man who knows enough not to have too many irons in the fire.
