### VIOLATED A BY-LAW; FINED IN POLICE COURT

#### Second-hand Dealer Did Not Keep Goods Two Days Before Sale.

By-laws regarding sales in second-hand shops must be observed. Mrs. Circle, who conducts a second-hand shop, admitted violating a by-law, when arraigned before Magistrate Farrell, in the police court on Friday morning, and was fined \$10 and costs, with the option of fifteen days in jail.

A second-hand dealer is required to keep a suit of clothes two days after receiving it before making a sale, but Mrs. Circle did not do this.

Demand Penalties For Fraud. The U. F. O. convention will deal with a resolution demanding the proper marking of woollen materials offered for sale in stores.

The resolution reads: "Resolved that all woollen materials and knitted goods manufactured, imported or offered for sale in Canada be marked when so offered for sale, so as to show the actual percentage of virgin wool in such materials and knitted goods; and be it further resolved that adequate penalty be provided for failure or refusal to mark materials and goods and for fraudulent marking of materials and goods."

Explanation of Letter Carriers. Kingston, Dec. 7.—(To the Editor): We noticed in your paper of Wednesday that the letter carriers came in for considerable discussion at the council meeting on Tuesday evening. We feel that we should make some explanations so that the public will not think we are blocking anything.

Our time to report for duty is 6.30 a.m., but if the alderman will take the trouble to visit the post office at 6 a.m. he will find the majority of the carriers there routing up their routes so that they can be out promptly at 7:30 a.m. so as to give the public first class service, for which they receive no credit.

If the letter carrier arrives at the junction of Rideau and Montreal streets at 10:30 a.m. and then rides in on the street car, it would be 10.40 a.m. when he would arrive at the office. After this he has to redirect and place changes of address in the books and look after other incidentals. It would be 11 a.m. before his work is completed. Just five hours on duty. How many more hours would these aldermen wish to add on to him to make a half a day's work and pretend to be the working man's friend?
