Bunt, Canton, is secretary, are busy making final arrangements for the 1924 school which is to be held in Cobourg the second week in January. This is one week later than last year.

Transferred to Toronto.

To Change Time of Conventions.
There is a growing opinion that school teachers should not interrupt their work to attend school conventions during the term and the provincial U.F.O. convention will have placed before it a resolution suggesting that said conventions be held immediately after the closing of the schools in June or just prior to their opening in September.

One of the Best.
The Carleton Place high school will be one of the best and most up-to-date institutions in its class in Ontario. The building, when completed, will cost \$125,000. There will be seven rooms, two laboratories, an auditorium with a seating capacity of 300, a gymnasium, two play rooms, two cloak rooms, principal's room, waiting room and library. This building has just been erected. The attendance now is 243 and many more students are expected.

Hilliard-Lebrow Wedding.
A quiet wedding was solemnized at the rectory of St. Thomas church, Belleville, on Thursday evening, when Miss Ethel Minnie Lebrow, of Trenton, was united in marriage with George Herbert Hilliard, Trenton. Archdeacon Beamish conducted the ceremony. Miss Marion Mouck, Belleville, was bridesmaid, and Mr. Percy Townsby, Belleville, groomsmen. The happy couple will reside in Trenton.

To Go To Australia.
Thomas Hawkes, with the General Motors of Canada, Limited, Oshawa, is leaving for Australia, to take charge of the new body plant at Adelaide, for Holden & Co., the largest automobile builders in Australia. This plant will build General Motors bodies exclusively for our sister dominion and will be the most up-to-date and completely equipped plant of its kind in Australia. Mr. Hawkes will act in an advisory capacity in the installation of the machinery, tools, etc., of the new plant and will superintend the actual body building until the plant is in full production and the system running smoothly. Mr. Hawkes will be in Australia ten months and probably longer.

Call to Rev. J. Rollins, B.A.
Rev. A. J. McMullen, interim-moderator of the Renfrew congregation, presented a call from St. Andrew's church, Renfrew, to Rev. James Rollins, B.A., Peterboro. The call was largely signed by 374 members and 85 adherents, promised a

stipend of \$2,500, free use of manse, and six weeks' holidays. The call was supported before Presbytery by James McLaughlin, W. R. Davies and E. A. Wright, for the managers. The call was transmitted to the presbytery of Peterboro, for its meeting on Dec. 12th. Tentative arrangements were made for Mr. Rollins' induction. The moderator of the presbytery is named to preside and induct; Rev. Mr. Thomas Appleton, to preach; Rev. Mr. Henry to address the minister, and Rev. Mr. Cliff to address the people.
