SERMON ON ADVENT.

By the Bishop of Ontario in St. George's Cathedral.

"Multitudes, multitudes in the valley of decision; for the day of the Lord is at hand in the valley of decision." From this text the Bishop of Ontario preached in St. George's cathedral on Sunday morning. Advent was set apart by the church for a two-fold object, first the preparation for the great feast of Christmas and secondly for the consideration of the judgment which every soul must face. We put it from us but as surely as those of whom the prophet Joel spoke, we are to-day in the valley of decision. God gave to everyone the power of choice; even taking heredity and environment into consideration, we still have to choose between good and evil. Christ spoke clearly of a day of judgment of the deeds done in the body. Judgment to come is an article of the creed not put there simply as an abstract article of belief but as an influence on our daily life. It is the linking up of our life with the fundamentals of our belief that makes the true Christmas character.
