TO FURNISH LIGHT FOR VESSELS IN THE HARBOR

Utilities Commission Will Also Provide Power for the Chemical Works.

At a meeting of the public utilities commission on Wednesday afternoon, Mayor Angrove asked that the necessary electric power connections be made with wharves along the harbor front so that light may be supplied for the large number of steamers wintering here. The general manager will see that the connections are made. The city council is paying for the light.

Dr. Atack made application for 150 horse-power for the new chemical works to be established here, and the commission will arrange for the supply.

By calling for new tenders and accepting a stock design, the commission saved one thousand dollars on the tables, counters and grill work for the new office. The tender of the School Furniture Company, Preston, Ont., for \$1,890 was accepted.

R. N. F. McFarlane (chairman), Mayor Angrove, H. C. Nickle, R. E. Burns and H. W. Newman were present.

THE BOARD OF WORKS SPLENDID RECORD

Much Done During Past Year With Less Money Than Spent in 1922.

The Board of Works has done splendid work this year under the chairmanship of Ald. Harry Sargent, who by the way has travelled, at his own expense too, a great many miles more than any other chairman in the performance of his duties. Ald. Sargent placed himself at the beck and call of all and sundry, and motored here, there and everywhere when complaints were made to him about road and walk repairs that were needed.

The Board of Works to date has expended \$29,312.65 on general street work as compared with \$30,659.96 during 1922. At the close of the year it will have expended fully one thousand dollars less than the 1922 board did, and it has more to show therefore. Out of this \$29,312.65 it has paid about \$5,423 in uncontrollable expenditure. For instance it paid \$1,500 for the purchase of land required in the extension of Brock street and also \$1,193 in repairs to the Princess street and other pavements. The Board of Works is to be congratulated for its good work during the year, which has seen a large amount of permanent road pavement done.

Dr. Service Pleaded Guilty.

After pleading guilty to a charge of bigamy before Judge Wallace at Woodstock, Dr. Herbert E. Service was allowed to go on suspended sentence on payment of the costs of the trial, amounting to \$25. The hearing was a retrial of a case when Dr. Service was found guilty of bigamy and sentenced to serve five years in penitentiary. Last spring, an application for a retrial was successful, and the accused was released on bail until such time as the new trial could be brought on. The outcome was a settlement of the case.

SIR JOHN MARTIN HARVEY AS DELIGHTFUL AS EVER

Appears at the Grand Opera House in "A Cigarette Maker's Romance."

"You cannot imagine the thrill we experienced when we crossed over into Canada and were able to work under the old flag once more." These words of Sir John Martin Harvey brought a thrill to the audience that filled the Grand Opera House last night and were received with great applause. The eminent English actor, after ten curtain calls at the conclusion of his company's admirable presentation of "A Cigarette Maker's Romance," was forced to respond to the audience's demand for a speech, and the actor-knight was as delightful in his little address as he was in his role. He told of the great joy of himself, Lady Martin Harvey and his London company to again meet so many of their old friends in Kingston, where it was a pleasure to appear, and they all hoped that it would not be long before they would pay Kingston another visit. They deeply appreciated the way their efforts had been received.

It is eighteen years since Sir John Martin Harvey first appeared in Kingston. He was then presenting "The Only Way," based on Dickens' "Tale of Two Cities." On all his American and Canadian tours since he has visited Kingston. His last appearance was three years ago. On his present tour, Kingston is the first place in Canada he has visited, the company coming here direct from Boston. After playing in the United States for some time, England's greatest actor might well be excused for making that touching reference to crossing again to British soil where the Union Jack waves.

One of Kingston's most representative audiences greeted Sir Martin and his company. "A Cigarette Maker's Romance," adapted from F. Marion Crawford's novel, was presented in the finished way that Harvey does things. Every little detail was perfect, for Sir Martin oversees everything himself. As "Count Skarlatine," the eminent actor, now past middle life, was superb. The years have not at all robbed him of his musical voice, his smile, his well-known gestures, or any of his past brilliance. He is always the restrained artist and his climaxes are masterpieces. Sir Martin has wonderful support by a company of picked English players. His wife, (Miss M. de Silva), who has been his leading lady through the greater part of his stage career, still plays opposite her distinguished husband, and takes the role of "Vera" in a most sympathetic manner. Other outstanding players are Walter Pearce as "Anton Skarlatine," Alfred Ibberson as "Christian," Eugene Wellesley as "Schmidt," Gordon Macleod as "Dummoit," Marie Linden as "Evelina" and Mary Gray as "Anna." The scenes are laid in Munich and the production is in three acts.
