A DELIGHTFUL LECTURE. Given by Rev. F. J. O'Sullivan, Port Hope.

Rev. F. J. O'Sullivan, Port Hope, for years assistant editor of the London Catholic Record and the Toronto Catholic Register, gave a delightful lecture in St. Joseph's hall, Hotel Dieu, Wednesday night on "Catholic Sentiment in non-Catholic Canadian Poets."

In introducing his subject, Father O'Sullivan gave three reasons why poetry is not popular to-day—materialism, lack of supernatural religion, and lack of sanity. Poetry is a minor revelation of God, and in its widest sense embraces all the fine arts, architecture, sculpture, painting, dancing and music. God raises up poets to give us supplementary glimpses of the beauty of His works. Even the pagan poets in their idealized creations of beauty, self-sacrifice and love prepared the people for the great mystery of the Incarnation. They did this unconsciously, for "thoughts beyond their thoughts to these high bards were given."

In like manner we find beautiful poetic tributes to faith and virtue from the pens of those who did not themselves possess the gift of faith.

With fine elocutionary effect Father O'Sullivan illustrated his thesis from the works of the late Marjorie Pickthall, quoting such poems as "Pleasant Marjorie," "Pere LaLement," and "The Lamp of the Poor Souls."

Mrs. F. J. O'Connor, president of the Ladies' Auxiliary, president, and the thanks of the meeting were conveyed to the lecturer by Rev. Dr. Casey and Mrs. J. F. Sowards.
