**Village Shop Trade Injured.**  
The fine weather and good roads are injuring the trade of the village stores as nearly all people with automobiles come many miles to Kingston to do their Christmas shopping. Had there been a snow storm the village trade would have been better.

**Withdrawing Sunday Trains.**  
Effective on Jan. 5th, the Canadian National railways are withdrawing from Sunday service passenger trains Nos. 20 and 21, operating between Montreal and Toronto. These trains will in consequence not leave Montreal or Toronto on Saturday nights until further notice after the date mentioned.

**Islanders Come Shopping.**  
The steamer Wolfe Islander made a special trip from Amherst Island this morning to enable the residents of Stella and the surrounding district to do Christmas marketing. The boat was crowded with passengers, as well as freight. Many of the farmers sent heavy consignments of

poultry, chickens, turkeys, ducks and geese to local merchants. They will not likely have another steamer before spring. After the ice forms, however, they are able to reach the mainland daily.

**Dredging Wolfe Island Harbor.**  
Dredging operations are being carried out at Wolfe Island by A. M. Rankin's plant. The water is very low and it was necessary to clean out the passage taken by the steamer to and from the wharf and increase the depth of water.

Kirk Rutherford, for more than thirty years C.N.R. agent at Collin's Bay, died suddenly in his office at the station on Sunday. Heart failure was the cause. Mr. Rutherford was seventy years of age and was active in the discharge of his duties right up to the time of his seizure with heart failure.

Trading was brisk on the market on Saturday and the whole atmosphere of the place spoke of better times. There was no "whisper of death" on Kingston market, Saturday, unless it was a faint echo of what some lordly turkeys heard during the week.

**Canadian Locomotive Co.**  
Five shares of Canadian Locomotive were sold during the past week at 70. This is the first sale recorded in this issue since Sept. 28th, and it also shows a price advance of \$7 per share. The smallness of the block and the fine outlook for the company with its heavy locomotive orders, undoubtedly caused the price advance.

**Postal Service Conference.**  
There will be a conference this afternoon between a sub-committee of the Board of Works and J. M. Campbell regarding the application for a daily letter carrier service to Hickson avenue. Residents of that vicinity feel the need of a service and it is hoped that it will not be necessary to send a deputation to Ottawa to secure it.

High income taxes are driving rich men out of stocks into tax exempt bonds. We may become a nation of bondholders. What does this mean to the average man?
