Brief but Important Lessons in Finance, Markets, Stocks, Bonds



High income taxes are driving rich men out of stocks into tax exempt bonds. We may become a nation of bondholders. What does this mean to the average man?

SETTLERS

Stockholders are the pioneers of industry, while the bondholders are the settlers. Stockholders are builders. They are partners in large of their usual bounteous Christmas scale productions, which has resulted in reduced costs of living.

Bondholders buy a mortgage on property, which stockholders have already built, thus providing the stockholders with more capital to go ahead again. If they fall, the bondholders foreclose and take over the property of the stockholders. Since there is more risk in holding

stock, only the man with a surplus can afford to be a stockholder. The rich man is the logical one to take that risk, yet he is not likely to. when he has to pay 50 per cent. of his profits in taxes. Consequently, high surtaxes are

tending to drive rich men's money into tax exempt bonds, where it pays no income tax. Unless the men with small incomes will risk their savings in pioneering, there is likely to be but little progress, and the cost of living will rise.


