Though Brown knew it was a dangerous job with so many armed detectives standing around, he took the chance in spite of this, and 'Red' an hour later at the station told the chief where he could probably find Brown, informing them of the girl Brown was going with."

Mixed Up in Murder?

Chief Brunskill says he believes the secret of Ryan's refusal to go back to Canada without a fight due to some murder case he has been mixed up in there which the Canadian authorities have not yet connected him with, though outlaw does not know that the police have not got such evidence as will send him to the scaffold. They cannot account for his stubborness on the question of going back in any other way.

Secretary Brown, of the St. Paul Bankers' Association, has informed the governor that his organization believes that it is in the interest of justice to have the robber sent back to Canada. Meantime, Detectives Duncan and Tucker are anxiously awaiting communications from Washington and Ottawa.
