The object of the order is to make salaries available for the Christmas holiday. In the ordinary way, the civil servants mentioned would not be paid till the end of the month.

Old Records Dug Up.
Old days of the Grand Trunk are recalled by the discovery in the attic of the Union station, Brockville, of a number of train despatchers' registers dated in 1875 and originating in the Grand Trunk despatching station at Kingston. From this point trains were despatched to Montreal and Toronto. Examination of the old register is interesting because of the comparison which it affords between the traffic of fifty years ago and that of the present time. The longest freight train listed on the sheet carried

twenty-seven cars, whereas it is now not uncommon for locomotives of the latest type to haul in the neighborhood of 100 cars, each of the cars much heavier than those of 1875. Of the employees of the Grand Trunk then, the sole man now believed to be in railway service is George Timleck, conductor on the Canadian National Railways between Toronto and Ottawa. Several others are on the pension list.

Foster Predicts Green Christmas.
Near the 25th, generally high temperatures, except low on Pacific slope. The last half of December will average warmer than usual east of the Rockies' crest, and cooler than usual on the Pacific slope; good corn-picking weather. Indications are that in three-fourths of Canada and America, the Christmas holidays will have good weather, except that many boys with sleds will be sadly disappointed. I am not expecting a white Christmas. This is not good news for those sections in which the 1924 crops largely depend on deep winter snow. Next month is somewhat of a puzzle. It contains some weather features that have not been fully worked out. The most severe disturbances for February center on the first and thirteenth.
