GUARDS ARE SOUGHT

Claude Cole, Owner of Islands, Urges Life-Saving Station Be Established.

Before another season of navigation opens, Lake Ontario mariners hope to have a modern life saving station established on the Main Ducks island, the grave yard of this lower waterway. Claude W. Cole. Cape Vincent, owner of the Main Ducks, will make concerted efforts to induce the Dominion life saving bureau to locate a station upon plot of ground which Mr. Cole has donated to the Canadian authorities for that purpose. In this effort he will unquestionably have the backing and support of the masters, owners and other marine interests of the lake.

The Main Ducks are recognized as the most dangerous point for shipping in Lake Ontario. Located on the principal route leading to and from the St. Lawrence river, and traversed also by the many craft that ply to and from Kingston and other Canadian ports at the lower end of the inland sea, these rocky islands, surrounded by dangerous reefs and vold of harbors, present a menace which has annually taken toll. This season closing Dec. 16th is the first when some craft has not got int serious difficulties, if not suffered complete loss, at the Main Ducks. Danger of the region has already been recognized by the Dominion through establishing there the most powerful lamp on Lake Ontario.

Efforts to have a coast guard station on the Ducks was made in 1921 when the subject was faid before the marine authorities of Canada. 

The tendency lately has been for the manufacturer to swing back to the jobber, instead of trying to sell direct to the dealer. The jobber gets He from 5 to 30 per cent., depending became man for our sakes, passing upon the line of business, yet the manufacturer has found in many cases that it is better for him to sell to the jobber, instead of trying to save that expense. Why?

In the first place, the manufacturer makes a slash in his own expenses. For instance, he ships out a few large packages to the jobber, where formerly he had a countless number. He only needs a few salesmen, and instead of having a large, expensive credit department, perhaps one man can keep in touch with

There is another factor, too, besides expense, which is important. The jobber gives him a steady demand, the year round, because he can judge the seasons in his locality and put in orders in advance. When manufacturer sells direct to dealers he is likely to be working nights.
