



Since 1900 the acreage of field crops in Canada has almost trebled and nearly 37,500,000 acres of new land have been brought under cultivation, an area slightly larger than that of England and Wales com-

Wheat Acreage Larger.

The area sown to wheat rose from less than 5,000,000 acres in 1901

Before 1900 Canada's wheat crop had never reached as high as 70,-600,000 bushels, while the crop for the present year (1923) is estimated at 470,328,000 bushels, or nearly seven times as great as it was at any time up to the opening of the present century.

Before 1900 Canada's exports of wheat had never totalled as much as 20,000,000 bushels, while exports for the twelve months ending July of this year aggregated nearly 230,-000,000 bushels, and Canada has taken first place among the world's wheat exporting nations.

Mineral production rose from \$66,000,000 in 1901 to \$183,000,000 in 1922, an increase of 177 per cent. The value of manufactured products increased from \$481,000,000 in 1900 to \$4,019,000,000 in 1920, an increase of over 700 per cent. in

The number of persons employed in manufacturing more than doubled between 1900 and 1920, increasing from 339,000 to 884,000. In the same period of twenty years the capital invested in manufacturing industries increased from \$400,000. 000 to \$3,400,000,000-that is by more than 700 per cent.

Water Power Developed. Dating from 1900, when the total installed horse power, was some 150,000 water power development in Canada has been very rapid, and today the Dominion possesses nearly 3,000,000 operating horse power and some 21,000 miles of transmission and distributing system. The total value of water power production for present installation is estimated at over \$83,000,000 per year.

Canada has just garnered the heaviest crop in her history. In addition to 470,328,000 bushels of wheat, government reports estimate Canada has grown this year 535, 124,000 bushels of eats; 80,048,000 bushels of barley; 28,159,000 bushels of rye and 8,000,000 buckwheat.
