Fire Chief W. A. Taro of the Everett, Washington, fire department, native and former resident of Brockville, has succumbed to injuries sustained while on the call of duty in that city.

Stole Handcar and Fowl.
Omer Jones, of the township of Bastard, was sentenced at Brockville to serve three months following a conviction of having stolen a handcar, and with two other men, Russell Burt and Samuel Golden, of the same district, with having stolen thirty-five chickens from a Lyndhurst man. Burt and Golden were released on suspended sentence on paying cost of the action and the cost of the fowl, which they sold in Perth at ten cents per pound.

Mother Superior Loses Arm.
An accident which caused a shadow of gloom among the reverend sisters, at the Hotel Dieu hospital, Cornwall, occurred on Monday, when the Mother Superior, Rev. Sister St. Patrick (Katherine Anne O'Shea of Apple Hill) had her right hand caught in the mangling machine in the hospital laundry, the injuries being such that amputation was necessary just below the elbow. At present she is getting along nicely. Sister St. Patrick has been in the hospital for the past fourteen years.

Industry Supplies Splints.
With an annual output of approximately thirty-six thousand millions of match splints, or in everyday speech, match sticks. The Canadian Splint and Lumber Corporation Limited, whose plant is at Pembroke

is kept busy. One hundred and sixty-five men and women are employed with an annual wage bill of approximately \$119,500, while the company's output in logs totals \$135,900 yearly. The greater part of the annual output of splints is shipped to Messrs Bryant & May, England, the largest match manufacturers in the British empire, and large shipments are also made to Belfast, Ireland.

Kiwans Christmas Tree.
About six hundred city children will be provided for by the Christmas tree committee of the Kiwanis Club. The committee held a meeting on Friday morning when reports were received showing the scope to be covered. All children in the city not likely to receive Christmas cheer have been listed and indications show that provision will have to be made for approximately 600 little ones. Already the subscriptions received from Kiwanians and their friends who desire to help spread joy among the deserving exceed \$400.

Hydro Rates Cut.
A communication has been received from the Hydro-electric Power Commission of Ontario notifying Havelock that a reduction in residential, commercial and street lighting rates will take effect the first of the year. The residential and commercial rates have been reduced by half a cent per kilowatt hour. In street lighting the reduction on 250-candle-power lamps is \$5 a lamp each year, and \$3 for 100-candle-power lamps. This will mean a considerable saving.

Bird Banding.
Sportsmen throughout Canada are urgently requested to write the Canadian National Parks Branch, Ottawa, giving full information about any banded birds they may see during the next hunting season. These bands are being placed through the voluntary effort of naturalists, sportsmen, and scientists, so that the fullest information about the migration routes of the fowls of the air may be obtained. A single band may be exceedingly valuable and add much to the known facts concerning your favorite game bird, or may help increase bird knowledge in other ways.

The Canadian National Parks needs for its file the detailed record of every banded bird found in Canada, and everyone who finds a banded bird can help make this record complete. If live banded birds are seen, they should be trapped alive, the number taken carefully, and then the birds should be released, perhaps to be heard from again elsewhere.
