BOO-HOO IS SHIPPED AWAY

To Reside on Main Duck Island Causes Too Much Trouble at Queen's.

Queen Boo-Hoo, the mascot of Queen's football team has been sent to the Main Duck Island and will be kept by C. W. Cole. "Billy" Hughes, Queen's trainer, and W. C. Shales saw Boo-Hoo off Saturday morning. She was chained to the forward mast of the steamer C. W. Cole with just enough slack to permit play without going over the railing. Boo-Hoo appeared to enjoy the experience immensely, and soon made herself familiar with everybody on the boat and on the wharf. Mr. Shales was always a constant companion of the bear and she would obey every word from him.

When asked whether Boo-Hoo would come back, Mr. Hughes said he was not sure, but it was probable that Boo-Hoo would remain on the Duck Island. Next year he may get a young cub. There is a great responsibility in training it.

For the past few days Boo-Hoo has been causing great excitement around the Harty Arena. Boo-Hoo is so playful that she takes great delight in pushing her foot through panels of glass. A couple of window frames which were stored under the seats in the arena came under the paw of the bear and she made a mess of them.

On Saturday morning last, the Queen's Athletic authorities were notified that the bear had broken out of the rink and was scaring the life out of a woman. When two clerks from the athletic board arrived they found Boo-Hoo having a great time in the yard at the rear of a Union street home. It took one hour and a half before Boo-Hoo was captured and during that time she entered the kitchen of the house and frightened the lady so badly that she ran out of the house. Boo-Hoo finished her rampage by climbing a tree and staying there for about half an hour.

RUSH AT POST OFFICE.

Heavy Consignment of Mail Handled Friday and Saturday.

On Friday and Saturday, the post office staff handled a very heavy consignment of mail.
