PICTON O.T.A. VIOLATIONS

Children's Aid Work in Prince Edward—Rifle Practice Is Carried On.

Picton, Dec. 22.—During the past week five cases of B.O.T.A. cost the offenders various sums on conviction by police Magistrate Williams. In each case the fine was \$10 and costs. Three others were "disorderly" and were arrested and "sobered up" in jail. The trio paid \$15 and costs. In the fifth case, \$200 and costs was the penalty for trading liquor for real estate. On conviction for trespass two convictions were made of \$10 and costs.

Irwin, government cheese grader also gave an instructive and comprehensive talk on the grading of cheese.
