

From Toronto to Montreal on the C.N.R .- Three Formerly Used.

The management of the Canadian National Railways has decided to place the large Moguls engines which were recently built at the Canadian Locomotive Works on the fast night trains between Montreal and Kingston. Six of the sixteen engines of this type have been kept in Ontario while ten have been sent to the Maritime provinces. When large engines were first turned over to the railway company, they were placed on freight trains for the purpose of getting them loosened up They did such fine work on freights that it was decided place them in the passenger service and they have proven very satisfactory. The big locomotives are making the whole trip from Montreal to Toronto, a distance of 330 miles. whereas three lighter engines used to be required to make this trip. The crews change at Brockville and Belleville as has been the custom for years, but two locomotives are

saved by using the large ones. 
